his time of year is always particularly busy, as we make plans for the new financial year.

Once again I'm pleased to let you know that Mansfield District Council's element of Council Tax will be frozen for a further year. As the Government grant continues to be reduced when demand for services is increasing, we need to work even harder with less and explore new ways to generate income and save costs. Mansfield's new Robin Hood Lottery is now live with the first draw taking place on Saturday 28 April.

ickets cost £1 per game and players could win up to £25,000 in the weekly draw. Other prizes are £2,000, £250, £25 or three free tickets. The online lottery has been set up by the council to support local good causes in the district and anyone over 16 can be in with a chance of winning.

Sixty pence from each ticket sold goes to local charities and good causes compared to 28p in the National Lottery - meaning that the money stays local and is used to support causes close to home. Players can choose which local cause or charity they want their money to go to.

It's as simple as going to www.robinhoodlottery.co.uk and selecting which cause to support.

Players who don't wish to support a particular charity or group can still play. with the same chances to win.

The remaining 40p from the ticket price goes towards the prize money. operating costs and VAT.

Players will be able to set up a monthly payment in advance with the option of a three, six or twelve month subscription by direct debit or payment card.

Winners will be informed via email and will have the money transferred automatically to their chosen bank account.

Digital hub on the way

A new shared reception for customers of the council and the Department for Work and Pensions (DWP) is due to open at Mansfield Civic Centre next month.

Significant building work has been taking place to transform the ground floor of the Civic Centre to provide improved facilities for customers.

A digital self-service hub is now open and can be accessed from the Chesterfield Road entrance while building work continues. Customers can use computer screens to access a range of council and DWP services in one location, including applying for or updating a range of DWP and council grant and benefit applications.

The Civic Centre remains open to the public as usual but the reception is currently split in two while work is carried out and services are temporarily accessible from specific locations until the new reception opens in May.

Some visitors will need to walk from the car park on Rosemary Street to the Chesterfield Road entrance using the public footpath. Extra help is available for people with mobility difficulties, please ask our reception staff for details. Temporary public toilets are available outside the Civic Centre.

Your Council Tax

The year ahead

The Mansfield District Council element of your Council Tax bill will remain the same in the financial year 2018/19 as it was back in 2010/11 after the council agreed to freeze it for the eighth consecutive year.

he funding we receive from the Government has gone down by 58% since 2010/2011. This is at a time when the demand for our services continues to increase. Mansfield District Council's Council Tax element only accounts for 9.84% of your total council tax bill. The rest of your bill is made up of charges from Nottinghamshire County Council, Nottinghamshire Fire and Rescue, Nottinghamshire Police and Crime Commissioner, and where applicable, Warsop Parish Council. The amount of Council Tax you pay depends on which of the eight bands your home is in - these are set by the Valuation Office Agency.

Rooms with a view

Good progress is being made on the construction of the council's £8.6m Town View housing scheme for people aged over 55.



two-bedroom apartments and 12 two-bedroom bungalows built in secured, landscaped grounds. They are expected to be ready for occupation in June.

All the properties have been designed either to accommodate wheelchair users or to be adaptable for wheelchairs to accommodate the possible future needs of tenants.

the apartment block consisting of a communal lounge, dining room, kitchen, activity rooms and outside terrace.

Six of the bungalows and 32 of the apartments will be rented by the council at an affordable rent (80% of a market rent) via the council's Homefinder service. Bidding for these properties has already begun and people downsizing from an under-occupied council home

will be designated as Extra Care Units, and these tenancies will be allocated by Nottinghamshire County Council.

The remaining six bungalows will be sold as Older Persons Shared Ownership homes. They are expected to go on the market this month and will be sold via a local estate agent.

Aspirational liv in Mansfield

Bringing forward Mansfield Homes, a commercial house building company, was one of the priorities for Mansfield District Council last year.

uilding homes to sell for profit is an important element of the long term financial strategy to bring sustainability to the authority and maintain services during financially challenging times.

The concept behind Mansfield Homes is very straightforward; it is an arm's length company that will build new houses for profit. Mansfield District Council is the sole shareholder so the profit comes back to the council. In order to get started, Mansfield District Council made a loan to the company of £8.8m which will be repaid with interest, along with the profits from the sale of the houses.

Building work on the first development on Windmill Lane, near to Carr Bank Park, will start next month. This is a prestigious development of 23 large four and five bedroomed houses in one road, with access off The Park.



The project aims to put as much back into the local community as it can by using local suppliers and spending within a short distance of the town.

The value of these homes will be in the region of £400k - £500k.

This provides a great return for the council and aspirational living opportunities for families wanting to reside here in Mansfield.

Willmott Dixon, the appointed building partner, will bring employment opportunities and apprenticeships to Mansfield residents along with work experience for students, talks to students about construction site health and safety as well as careers in construction. A further £1.6m will also be spent in the supply chain within a 10 mile radius of the town and local contracts have been awarded to accountants, a company secretary and an estate agency all from Mansfield.

Mansfield Homes is considering four other sites across the district and further plans will be announced later in the vear.

Mortgage deposit scheme set to help new buyers

The council is planning to launch a mortgage deposit lending scheme designed to help first-time buyers get a foot onto the property ladder.

The aim is to make home ownership more affordable, which is in line with the council's vision of making the district a place where everyone can succeed.

The pilot scheme is being developed to assist those in the private rented sector who want to buy their first home in the district.

Evidence suggests that many who rent privately pay more for their rent than a mortgage would cost, but they are unable to save for a full deposit.

It is hoped the scheme will start later this year - so we'll keep you posted as more details are confirmed.



Mansfield:

The regeneration of Mansfield's town centre is a top priority for Mansfield District Council and three projects are spearheading these efforts to revitalise the town as a destination for shopping and business.

he town's movers and shakers are determined to ensure that Mansfield takes its place on the list of places to visit in Nottinghamshire.

The district council, in partnership with local business organisations and funding bodies, are driving forward three major projects which will help paint the town in a brighter, fresher light and which, in turn, will stimulate the local economy.




Top of the list is a plan to open an 80bed hotel on the council-owned site of the former bus station in Stockwell Gate North, which the authority has been keen to redevelop ever since the bus station was relocated in 2013.

This is a crucial development – complimented by plans for a second hotel at Mansfield Town Football

Club – because the town has been short of hotel beds for some time.

Hotel guests bring valuable business to the town. It is estimated that based on Visit England's national average 70% double occupancy level, an 80-bed hotel could welcome up to 41,000 visitors a year,



as well as creating 50 to 60 jobs. The boost to the local economy could be £3.6m a year, based on a typical overnight spend of £170.

Mike Robinson, Director of Economic Growth at Mansfield District Council, explained: "Having at least one hotel in the town centre will make a huge difference. Hotel quests mean more people using local pubs, restaurants and shops, as well as jobs for local people.

"This is a key gateway site in Mansfield and will help make the town centre a more inviting and eniovable place to visit and stav as well as driving footfall into town centre shops and businesses.

"We also believe that the new hotel." once operating, could act as a catalyst for further developments and inward investment in the town."

Plans to redevelop the old bus station site are now pressing ahead. The council is in the process of selling the land to the ARBA Group,

a Mansfield firm, for redevelopment.

ARBA intends to build an 80-bed hotel with roof terrace, restaurant, café, bar and gym. The proposed scheme includes a piazza and open space along with other landscaping.

Negotiations are ongoing between ARBA, the council, a national hotel chain, and food and drinks operators to bring the plans to fruition over the next two years.

Richard Burns, managing director of the ARBA Group, added:

"Being local, we know Mansfield is a perfect location for this type of development. It is surrounded by a number of hugely popular tourist destinations and we need to be making sure that when people come to this area, their hotel stay is in Mansfield."

Making more of Mansfield's hidden gems

The appearance of one of Mansfield's most historic thoroughfares - Leeming Street - is also something which the council believes could be enhanced.

> Many of the old buildings on the street have suffered over the years with unsympathetic adaptations which have robbed the area of its architectural splendour.

So now the council is bidding for nearly £1m from the Heritage Lottery Fund which will support businesses in a five-year conservation programme, and help those wishing to make repairs and alterations to buildings to do them in a way which will enhance the look of the area to reflect its history and heritage.

It could be restoring original sash windows, for example, or re-instating the old fashioned hanging signs outside shops.

The scheme will go hand in hand with a community engagement programme which could, for instance, give local tradespeople the chance to learn traditional conservation and restoration skills and opportunities for local people to chart the history of the street, which was once one of the most elegant in the town.

Mike Robinson said: "We have to try to make more of what Mansfield has - and it has a lot more than people might first consider in terms of heritage and beauty in its old buildings.

"The town has hidden gems and we want more people - both visitors and those who live here - to see those jewels sparkle more brightly and feel proud that Mansfield is their home town."



Another important strand to the council's regeneration vision for the town centre is bringing one of its most significant buildings back into full use for the first time in more than 30 years.

The Old Town Hall is set for a £1.4m revamp which will see new shop units on its ground floor and offices on the upper floors.

Built in 1836, the Grade II* Listed building was last fully used as a

town hall in 1986 and was in need of substantial repairs which were carried out in 2016 at a cost of £550,000.

Now D2N2 Local Enterprise Partnership has confirmed a pot of £7.6m to boost towns and local centres in Nottinghamshire.

Mansfield is bidding for £700,000 of that to help pay for the cost of changing the use of the town hall and completing its renovation.

The council believes that one way to help boost the town's image as a shopping destination is to have a wider variety of shops on offer and it is hoped that the units at the town hall will appeal to businesses.

This is a prestigious building in a prime location, which will appeal to upmarket retailers. These are the kind of businesses the council wants to attract to improve Mansfield as a shopping destination.

New customer portalities all about you!

Putting customers at the heart of what we do is an important step in the council's journey to become a 21st Century authority.

he first major improvement is the creation of a new customer portal which allows residents to do more business with the council online.

You can report issues online from abandoned vehicles and missed bins to fly-tipping. You can receive feedback on live enquiries, check Council Tax balances, sign up and pay for Council Tax and most importantly access tailored content, such as bin days and 'find my nearest', based on the account address.

To get the most out of the portal, which will be fully launched next month, register for an account by following the guide at www.mansfield.gov.uk/portal.

Customers can apply for services like assisted bin collections, event notices or jobs and pay for services. Application forms for Council Tax reductions and change of circumstances will be available as an e-form for the first time.

The portal hosts enhanced forms with report back functions, which provides better reporting to customers and improves communication. The portal will also facilitate the council's efforts to reduce more expensive communication methods such as direct telephone support and encourage self-service. By doing more online business the council can review and streamline resources to better suit a new generation of customers.

DOING MORE ONLINE

This year, the council will be looking to bring key services online through the digital transformation programme. A new online system for Revenues and Benefits will be available from the summer, an improved payments system will allow more online transactions to take place and a waste and recycling system will change the way in which we manage the waste and recycling service - including in-cab technology that will bring real-time reporting from kerbside to customer.

If in doubt, leave it out!

Have you ever been in two minds over whether or not something can be recycled?

ou're not alone - with different areas of the country having different recycling rules according to what their local recycling facilities can accept, it can be confusing.

Most people in the district know the basics - that cardboard and paper, tins and cans, and plastic bottles can be disposed of in the blue bin.

So if you're not sure, the best advice is stick to the basics. Think 'if in doubt, leave it out!' and put the waste in your green general waste bin instead of the recycling bin.

Doing this may help to reduce Mansfield's recycling contamination rate which is the highest in Nottinghamshire and could land the council with costly charges if too much waste is rejected by the county's recycling plant.

Sign up now for garden waste collections



Mansfield District Council's garden waste collection service runs from April 2018 to March

2019 and costs £30 a year for 22 collections - about £1.36 per collection.

Waste collections are fortnightly from April until November, with monthly collections from December to February. returning to fortnightly collections in March.

The brown bin can be used for:

- grass cuttings
- hedge trimmings
- leaves
- small branches and twigs
- plants
- weeds
- cut flowers.

The annual cost of the service is £30 regardless of when people sign up, so residents are urged to join now to get the most out of the service. It costs £15 for each extra bin, up to a maximum of four bins. To sign up for the service, register online at www.mansfield.gov.uk/ gardenwaste.

Residents' health under the spotlight



A commission set up to tackle serious health and wellbeing issues across the district was due to meet for the first time as My Mansfield went to print.

The Healthy Mansfield Commission, set up by the Executive Mayor Kate Allsop, was due to set the priority areas for consideration at a meeting on 22 March.

The commission will continue to meet every month until August before a final report is produced containing recommendations for a healthier Mansfield.

According to Mansfield's health profile published on 4 July 2017 by Public Health England, the health of people in Mansfield is generally worse than the England average. The district is one of the 20% most deprived districts and 23% of children in this area live in low income households. Life expectancy is over ten years lower for men and eight years lower for women in the most deprived areas of Mansfield.

These stark statistics will be included in the discussion points of the commission which will be chaired by Les Marshall, a former councillor at Mansfield District Council and former chairman of economic development, leisure and housing committees.

Every year hundreds of people across the district benefit from advice on healthy eating and exercise from the council's Health Development team.

embers of the team regularly visit schools to talk to primary school children, teachers, kitchen staff and midday supervisors about healthy lifestyles, including the importance of having breakfast, what to include in a balanced lunchbox and how much exercise they should be doing.

Sessions can include making and tasting foods such as healthy wraps, vegetable cakes, fruit pizzas and smoothies.

The team also offers practical cooking sessions for disadvantaged families to help them to improve their knowledge. behaviour and confidence around nutrition and exercise. Adults and children are encouraged to forget the stresses and strains of everyday life and spend more time together making simple, healthy recipes in a fun and interactive way.

Organisations across the district can benefit from health MOTs including having their Body Mass Index (BMI),

body fat and muscle percentage measured and their blood pressure checked. Practical cooking sessions are also available to encourage staff to make low cost, quick and healthy meals at home.

Cook and eat sessions are available for individuals in small or large groups that want to learn the basics of cooking, cooking on a budget and confidence building over six weeks.



A free event to encourage older people to be more active and eat well is held at Mansfield Museum on the last Friday of every month. Feel Good Fridays, from 11am to 1pm, is run in partnership with Mansfield District Leisure Trust. It includes activities such as short tennis or boccia followed by making a healthy snack such as fruit with layers of yoghurt and cereal and advice on a balanced diet. Everyone is welcome and participants range in age up to 93-years-old!

Free fruit for everyone!

Pupils from Asquith Primary School and members of the **Greenwood Forest Community** Team have helped plant a new community orchard in Jackson's Field, off Mill Street, in Mansfield.

A total of 72 trees and 200 hedging shrubs were planted, including apples, pears, plums, cherries, medlers, hazelnuts, mulberries, hawthorn, blackthorn, and elder.

As well as creating a greener environment, the scheme aims to promote a healthier lifestyle among residents who will be able get out and enjoy the orchard and pick and use the fruit that the trees and shrubs will produce.

Each apple tree could produce 365 fruits a year. This is enough free apples to provide one of your five-a-day for a whole year - or 90 apple pies!

It will also be fantastic resource for schools and a place for schoolchildren to visit in the



future to learn about the wildlife. The aim is to have benches there where people can enjoy picnics.

It is also hoped that the orchard will bring people together and inspire them to care for their local environment by helping to maintain the orchard with tasks such as pruning the trees.

The grass in the orchard will be allowed to grow to enable wildlife to flourish. It will take five years for the trees to start producing a harvest of fruit, berries and nuts.

The trees in Jackson's Field make this the ninth community orchard to be planted in Mansfield district over the past five years a total of 665 fruit trees.



Objection! What is a legitimate objection in planning?

This is our second article on planning issues, this time looking at how to raise an objection to a planning application.

he council's Local Plan sets out what land is needed for sustainable housing and business development across the district and which areas need to be protected. It also includes a range of policies on a number of issues.

New homes or businesses can be established where land is earmarked for development, with the proposer or developer submitting an application to the council for a decision. Members of the public can object to the proposals, but any objections must be legitimate. 'material planning considerations.'


What is a material planning consideration?

This is a factor which is relevant to a planning decision - whether granting or refusing a planning application.

What constitutes a material consideration is wide and the courts often do not indicate what cannot be a material consideration. However. the courts generally take the view that planning is concerned with land use in the public interest. The protection of purely private interests such as the impact of a development on the value of a neighbouring property, commonly referred to as a NIMBY objection, is not a material consideration.

Material considerations can include, but are not limited, to:

- Government policy
- Proposals in the Development
- Overlooking/loss of privacy
- Loss of light or overshadowing
- Parking
- Highway safety
- Traffic
- Noise and disturbance
- Smells and fumes
- Effect on listed buildings and conservation area
- Layout and density of building
- Design, appearance and materials
- Landscaping
- Disabled persons' access
- Previous planning decisions (including appeal decisions)
- Nature conservation and ecological factors
- Neighbours' letters if material planning considerations are

Examples of non-material considerations include:

- Loss of a private view
- Loss of property value
- Private disputes between neighbours or boundary positions
- Who the applicant is or their history
- Planning application has been submitted retrospectively
- Strength of opposition
- Personal views about an application
- Opposition to business competition

The council is working to bring forward sustainable development across the district, in line with the Local Plan, to make Mansfield a destination of choice for business, housing and leisure.

Local Plan: the next steps...

Following the consultation on the Local Plan Preferred Options between October and November last vear, the council is in the process of reviewing the numerous comments it received. The preferred options set out the council's preferred housing and employment allocations to meet the district's housing, leisure and business development needs between now and 2033.

The next steps for preparing the plan are:

- publication consultation, this is a statutory consultation in which representations can only be made on the grounds of legal compliance, duty to co-operate and soundness.
- submission of the local plan to the Planning Inspectorate

These steps will be completed by the autumn.
