News

ansfield District Council has some serious challenges in the year ahead in the face of decreased central government funding.

It is a situation that brings major challenges for council bosses nationwide, but in Mansfield, the council is determined to embrace these new ways of working.

The start of 2016 saw the council facing a budget gap of over £2million. It has managed to achieve the savings needed and balanced the budget with only a minimal impact on staff and services.

Going forward, to meet an expected ongoing shortfall in funding, the council is having to be more innovative - and commercially orientated to bridge that financial gap, as well as creating a stable authority which is fit


for the future.

We will also aim to streamline some of our services by making more use of digital technology to deliver them without becoming a faceless organisation. Customer focus will remain the council's priority.

Sharing the load

One of the ways the public sector is changing is that different authorities are increasingly combining and sharing services. The new Community Partnership Hub at the Civic Centre, now a base for both the police and council's Community Safety team, is an example of this new way of working.

This kind of partnership working will be seen across the public sector and also with local businesses in order to meet the council's priorities and tackle some of the chronic issues that have affected the quality of life for residents.



- in the way it delivers services and the way it is financed.

Life expectancy in the district is ten years below the UK average, there are high levels of obesity, and the district has one of the highest rates of domestic violence in the county. We will be playing our part in how these issues can be tackled by working closely with other authorities.

Regeneration

The council continues to be involved in schemes to help bring jobs to the Mansfield and Ashfield area and to help up-skill the workforce of the future.

One initiative is the Enterprising Ashfield and Mansfield Project (Ambitious in Ashfield and Mansfield) which is working with secondary schoolchildren to highlight the skills employers in the area are seeking and to inspire teenagers to think bigger so that they are equipped for the jobs of the future - or even inspired to launch their own ventures.

Despite the financial challenges it has and continues to face, the performance of Mansfield District Council in the past year has been the best for five years. This is a record that we have every intention of building on.

Easter and bank holiday bin collections

Bin collections will run as normal during the Easter and May Day bank holidays. Bins should be put out for collection at the usual time. Bin crews can't return if bins aren't out on time.

The National Minimum and Living Wage is going up on 1 April 2017.



You are legally entitled to, at least, either the National Living Wage or National Minimum Wage if you are working and over the age of 16.

From 1 April this year, if you are on the National Living Wage or the National Minimum Wage, dependent on when you are paid, you should automatically see an increase in your pay. It is illegal for your employer to pay you below the National Minimum or National Living Wage, so check your pay and talk to your boss to make sure you're getting what you are entitled to. Even if you are being paid at or slightly above the National Minimum or Living Wage, you could still be missing out. This can happen if your employer makes mistakes in calculating your pay. Help us tackle fly-tipping hazard

Fly-tipping – when someone illegally dumps waste – is a real danger and a health hazard. And it's an eyesore which ruins the appearance of local neighbourhoods, spoiling everyone's enjoyment.

ly-tipping occurs on public or privately owned land without permission from the land owner, or on land that doesn't have a waste management licence.

If you see or know of someone who is fly-tipping, report them to us. We will visit the site and - if it is the council's responsibility - we will remove the waste. If the rubbish is deposited on private property it's the responsibility of the landowner to remove it.

Every household and business has a duty to dispose of its waste correctly. Under this duty of care, householders must make sure that waste is properly disposed of, using a registered waste carrier.

https://environment.data.gov. uk/public-register/view/searchwaste-carriers-brokers So, when you get people to take your waste away, you'll need to check that they hold a waste carrier licence - and ask for a receipt when your waste is collected. If someone takes your waste away and fly tips it, you will still be held responsible.

Removing fly-tipped waste is expensive. It costs the council thousands of pounds - money which could be used to provide other services.

Fly-tipping is a crime and people convicted of this offence receive a criminal record. At Magistrates' court offenders can face an unlimited fine and/or a term of imprisonment up to 12 months, and at Crown Court the punishment can be an unlimited fine and/or imprisonment for up to five years.

Oliver finds a fur-ever home

Oliver the wire haired terrier cross puppy came into the care of Mansfield District Council on 26 December when he was picked up by the dog warden with no microchip.

fter seven days of being cared for at the council's contract kennels unfortunately the owner failed to come forward. Oliver was then placed for adoption by the kennels after being fully vaccinated and microchipped. He was also given a health check, a bath and flea and worm treatment.

The public got involved in the council's 'Lost and found dogs' campaign on Facebook, which aims to help reunite lost dogs with their owners and rehome them if the owner isn't found.

Both the council and kennels were inundated with calls. Facebook messages and posts from eager members of the public who wanted to give Oliver a home.

Sarah Kirk from Shirebrook was quick

off the mark and was carefully selected by the kennels as Oliver's new owner. She welcomed him into her family and adopted him on 4 January 2017.

Sarah named him Oliver (the orphan) and has made him feel at home. Together they enjoy going out for long walks and meeting people along the way- he is a very popular little chap!

The Dog Control service helps to care for many lost, abandoned and stray dogs in the district every year. We provide a call out service out of hours in case of an emergency and help to reunite people whose dogs have escaped.



It is now law to have your dog microchipped and to keep your contact details up to date on the microchip database. This helps us and other authorities to reunite dogs with their owners much more quickly.

Many owners however fail to abide by this law so our Facebook campaign is an essential part of tracking down owners and raising awareness of the service we offer. which includes microchipping.

Thanks to the council's Facebook campaign, Oliver's post reached over 103,000 people and saw over 2,200 people react, comment and share his photo.







Working together in new Hub

The new Community Partnership Hub at Mansfield's Civic Centre has got off to a flying start and already the benefits of closer working with the police are delivering results.

The Hub opened in November and now means the police and Mansfield **District Council's Community Safety team** are grouped together in shared offices.

The council's Community Safety Manager, Lesley Reece, said: "I think it has helped us become guicker and more efficient in the way we tackle things like graffiti and anti-social behaviour.

"We now have access to the police networks which helps. And we get to go to the police briefings twice a day so we know what is going on.

"If someone has been given bail conditions that ban them from the town centre, for instance, we can now tell the CCTV operators to be aware."

The council can now also tap into the police links with the wider community such as schools and community organisations.

Sin bins!

One problem most likely to have residents on the phone to the council is the discovery that their bin has not been emptied.

So why are there disruptions to this service?

A common issue is that a vehicle is obstructing a route, making it impossible for bin lorries to get through. Unfortunately, it only takes one person parking inconsiderately for our drivers to find they cannot get round a corner or along a street because there is not enough space. That means a whole street may not get their bins emptied.

Score a bin win

- Make sure your bin is out by 6.30am on collection day
- Don't fill your general waste bin with heavy materials as this could make it too heavy for the lorry lifting mechanism
- Do not put the wrong waste in your bin. It will not be collected if the waste is contaminated
- In bad weather, your bin may not be emptied at the allotted time. If it is missed, leave it out and the crews will get to it eventually
- Make sure the bin is on the pavement so that crews can find it
- Don't leave extra bags or bulky items beside the bin. There is an extra service to dispose of bulky items. See the council's website
- Take care how you park. Blocking bin lorry routes means dozens of homes don't get their bins emptied on time.

It's better by bus

Ninety two per cent of passengers are happy with local bus services - up from 60 per cent who were satisfied with services before the new bus station in Mansfield was built.

Bus shelters in town display information about local buses. Mansfield Bus Station offers timetables for local bus routes and has an electronic journey planning kiosk. 95 per cent of passengers rated the provision of information as good or very good.

The bus station has 16 bays fitted with real-time information displays, with 14 more real-time displays at bus stops in the town centre, taking away some of the uncertainties often linked to travelling by bus. 86 per cent of passengers said they would welcome more real time information displays in the town.

98 per cent of passengers said that maintenance and cleanliness of the bus station was good or very good.

These figures are taken from the county council's annual passenger survey.

Garden waste collection service

Want to recycle your grass cuttings, weeds and hedge trimming? Don't forget to sign up for **Mansfield District Council's** garden waste collection service.

Council Tax frozen for seventh year

For the seventh year running Mansfield District Council has frozen its element of Council Tax.

This year's budget setting process has been one of the most difficult in the last decade. The reduction in the government grant from £10.5m to £4m, reduced income from traditional investment sources and increasing demands are taking their toll on the council's finances.

The authority has risen to the financial challenges it faces and once again the budget remains balanced without a Council Tax increase on the Mansfield District Council element. We have done this by identifying efficiency savings and additional income as well as using some one-off sources of income and reserves.

Resources are shrinking across the public sector and the council is responding by looking at new ways of doing things. That might mean sharing staff and office accommodation with partners to reduce duplication, or making some of our services available on a commercial basis to generate income.

We need to find £4m worth of savings or additional income - or both - by 2020. There will be difficult decisions to make during the year ahead as the council investigates its current commitments.

The income from our commercial activities will be used to help the council to continue delivering local services for residents across Mansfield and district.

Mansfield District Council collects Council Tax in the district on behalf of Nottinghamshire County Council, Mansfield District Council, Nottinghamshire Police and Crime Commissioner, Nottinghamshire Fire Authority and Warsop Parish Council.

long with government grants and, in some cases, charges for services, Council Tax helps to pay for local services provided by these organisations.

The total Council Tax bill for Mansfield district residents was finalised earlier this month when the charges for Mansfield District Council, Nottinghamshire County Council, Nottinghamshire Police and Crime Commissioner, Nottinghamshire Fire Authority and Warsop Parish Council (for Warsop residents) were added together.

Council Tax is calculated using a formula devised by the Government's Valuation Office Agency, based on the price that a property would have sold for in April 1991. Most properties in Mansfield district – 26,983 out of 48,822 are in Band A, the lowest Council Tax band.

Council Tax reductions

Residents on a low income or who receive certain welfare benefits may be able to claim a 90% reduction on their Council Tax bill. Some pensioners could claim a 100% reduction.

Households with one adult occupier are entitled to a 25% discount.

If there are two or more adults in the household, you may still qualify for a discount if one of the occupiers:

- is a full-time student, student nurse or apprentice
- has a severe learning disability
- is a young adult who is still eligible for child benefit, or
- is a full-time carer looking after someone.

Disabled people

If your household includes a person with a disability you may be entitled to an adjustment on your Council Tax valuation band. If your home is already in the lowest band, you will still get a reduction.







Who will run the elections?

The Returning Officer is Anthony May, the Chief Executive Officer of Nottinghamshire County Council. He has appointed Deputy Returning Officers at each of the seven district councils who are responsible for running the elections in their own particular area. Bev Smith, Chief Executive Officer, has been appointed as Deputy Returning Officer at Mansfield District Council and, along with her elections team, will be responsible for ensuring the election is effectively administered in the Mansfield district.

Who can vote at the **Nottinghamshire County** Council elections?

You can vote in these elections if you are registered to vote and are:

- a resident in that area
- a British Citizen living in the UK or registered to vote as a Crown Servant or member of the armed services
- a European Union Citizen living in the UK
- a Commonwealth Citizen who either does not need leave to be resident in the UK, or has the necessary leave and is legally resident in the UK.

What voting system will be

The first past the post system will be used. Voters will have one or two votes, depending on how many candidates are to be elected to represent their Electoral Division. The Mansfield district is divided into five County Electoral Divisions. Apart from the Warsop division, where voters will have one vote, voters who live in the north, south, east and west divisions will be electing two members.

Polling stations

Most of the polling stations in operation in the Mansfield district on 4 May will be the same as those used for the June 2016 EU Referendum. Please make sure you check your poll card for details of your polling station. Poll cards will be delivered to registered voters by 31 March. Registered voters can check their nearest polling station at www.mansfield.gov.uk/article/ 6275/Find-it

Key election timetable dates for you to note:

- The list of candidates standing for election will be announced on Wednesday 5 April
- Deadline to register to vote -Thursday 13 April
- Deadline for new postal vote applications and changes to existing postal or proxy votes -5pm on Tuesday 18 April
- Deadline for new applications to vote by proxy (except for medical emergencies or emergencies where a person has been called away as a result of their occupation, service or employment) - 5pm on Tuesday 25 April
- Polling day 7am to 10pm on Thursday 4 May
- Votes will be counted on Friday 5 May and the results will be posted on the council's website on 5 May.

t also sets out the areas that need protection, including open spaces and areas with high environmental quality or historic value.

The Local Plan will contain a policies map of the district showing where land has been identified for different uses like housing, employment and open space. Once adopted, the Local Plan will form part of the statutory Development Plan covering Mansfield, which forms the basis for all planning decisions.

In 2016 we undertook a consultation seeking views on the draft plan and supporting documents.

Based on the responses we received from these consultations, and government guidance, we commissioned further studies to inform the next stage of the Plan, including an updated Housing and Employment Land Availability Assessment.

Next steps:

- **Spring 2017**: We will hold a six-week consultation on the results of the Housing Employment Land Availability Assessment, Comments received will be used to update the Local Plan.
- Autumn 2017: We will hold a sixweek consultation on the revised Local Plan and will seek views on whether the Local Plan meets the government's tests of soundness. Comments received will be provided to the Inspector when the Local Plan is submitted for examination.
- Early 2018: We will submit the Local Plan to the Secretary of State for examination by an Independent Inspector for a decision to be made.
- Summer 2018: Final decision on the Local Plan.

Building Control

If you are having an extension. a loft conversion, or any structural alteration to your home, vou'll need Building **Control Approval.**

The council's award-winning **Building Control team has** qualified surveyors who can help to make sure that any building project is safe and legal.

Once plans of the proposed building work are submitted, they will be checked by building control surveyors within 10 working days to make sure they meet building regulations. Surveyors will also offer advice if any alterations are needed. The team also inspects the work on site to approve the structure. its construction and health and safety aspects of the project.

Surveyors can provide advice on what is needed for each building project and the team offers an hour of free, impartial, pre-application advice to help make sure that any project is right first time.

The team is based in Mansfield so surveyors know the local area well, and the service is highly competitive as fees are charged at cost - local authority building control teams aren't allowed to make a profit.

Mansfield District Council's Building Control Department comes under the umbrella of the LABC (Local Authority Building Control).

The food court has seen improvements with the introduction of new seating and a canopy to offer visitors shelter from the rain or sun while enjoying what the local food vendors have to offer.

Green teams

Mansfield is fortunate in having an array of award winning parks and one reason they are so special is because of the vital support they receive from volunteers.

lhere are a number of 'Friends of' groups which help the council's parks team to improve and maintain local green spaces - and they are always looking for new members. **Mansfield District Council is particularly** keen to start new Friends groups at King George V Park and Peafield Park.

The involvement of Friends groups has been crucial in helping to achieve green flag status at seven open spaces in the area, including: Carr Bank Park, Titchfield Park, King George V Park, Yeoman Hill Park, and Peafield Park and Local Nature Reserves at Quarry Lane. Mansfield, and The Carrs, Warsop.

The newest Friends group to be set up is Friends of Pleasley Community Orchard which is a free fruit garden opened late last vear by the local lay pioneer minister from St Augustine's and St Barnabas' Churches,



Matt Arnold, with the help of volunteers and local councillors.

Mr Arnold said: "Volunteers have come together to create this wonderful green space. Our plans for the future include laying down paths, installing bee hives, creating raised beds for soft fruits, and setting up an outdoor classroom - if we can raise adequate funds."

The orchard has so far secured donations from councillors, businesses and charitable organisations such as the Postcode Local Trust.

The future of **Meden Sports** Centre

The council has concluded an eight week consultation on the provision of sports and leisure facilities in Warsop, Users of Meden Sports Centre, local residents and people with an interest in the centre were asked to give information on how they use their local sports centre and how likely they would be to use other services around the district. In total we had 479 submissions.

The consultation provided part of the information that was considered when the decision on whether the council continues to manage the centre and provide community use was taken.

For many years, the council deliberated over the future of Meden and has concluded that the current management arrangement is no longer sustainable.

The key concerns are over the condition of building and whether it is fit for purpose.

An options appraisal identified suggestions for refurbishment and rebuild. however, in the current financial climate there are insufficient capital funds to support these options.

Nottinghamshire County Council (who owns the land and the building) has agreed to work with Meden School to provide suitable facilities for Physical Education and find provision at alternative pools to accommodate the school's swimming programme.

The decision is currently subject to a call-in review.

Showing their metal...

Dave and Angela are aiming to break into the high end interior design market with Metal Monkey's creative coverings, which could be used, for instance, in the interiors of super yachts or private jets.

Quality results are Dave's main aim so to achieve this, the company works from spotlessly clean premises "not even a fly will be landing on any coated surface", says Dave. "If a premises is not clean in this business, then neither will the work be," he says.


Heritage **Lottery Fund** awarded to the council

Director of Public Health's **Annual** Report

Every year Nottinghamshire's **Director of Public Health** produces a report to raise awareness of local health issues, highlight areas of concern and make recommendations for change.

This year's report focuses on how where we live - as well as how we live - shapes our health and wellbeing, including how long we live and our quality of life, and the impact this has on local health and social care services. For example, healthy life expectancy in the north of the county is up to six years less than in the south of the county.

The report examines how health starts with where we live and how important this is. It also looks at how our behaviour and the choices we make can affect our health and wellbeing and stresses that we have a part to play in improving our own health.

Finally, it sets out the impact on the health and care system caused by dealing with preventable diseases and recommends action for the future.



We have 10 excellent 'Friends of' groups who work with our parks team to improve and maintain their local green spaces. They get involved in a range of activities from litter picking, bulb and tree planting to fundraising, and often work with children to encourage them to take an active interest in horticulture and conservation. We're always looking to inspire more members of our community to get involved with the existing groups at Carr Bank Park, Titchfield Park and Quarry Lane LNR (Maun Conservation),

Both Titchfield and Carr Bank parks offer an increasingly popular sport for all abilities. Petanque (Boules) - often seen in France - has taken off tremendously with Titchfield Park being proud host to Mansfield Petanque Club, which offers friendly and competitive games for its members. Carr Bank Petangue Club aims to provide the sport mainly for friendly and social activity.

Our parks and opens spaces provide excellent play and fitness opportunities. We manage 38 play areas, three outdoor gyms and five skate parks across the district.

Allotments also have a big part to play in encouraging healthy lifestyles and promoting ways of growing and eating for good health and enjoyment. If you are interested in growing your own, you can get in touch with us to find out about available allotment plots in your area. Half plots are also available on many of our sites if a full-size plot is a bit too much to manage.

Helping victims of domestic violence

The council has been awarded a share of £661,946.50 from the Government to support victims of domestic abuse and violence who have complex needs like mental ill health or alcohol and substance issues.

The money will be used to maintain and increase spaces at refuges across the county and provide more specialist support services for women and children fleeing harm.

The district councils, Nottinghamshire Women's Aid, Women's Aid Integrated Services (WAIS) and the county council will work together to make sure that those who need help and support can get it, wherever they are. The funding will be used to support around 646 victims of domestic abuse and violence.

A new leaflet has been published by the council's Domestic Violence Prevention Officer which provides details about the Domestic Violence Disclosure Scheme, otherwise known as Clare's Law. The scheme provides a mechanism for you to request information from the police if you are concerned a person may have an abusive past. The police will investigate your concerns and decide whether to disclose information and who it should be shared with.

You can ask for a disclosure if you are worried about your partner's history or are concerned about the

partner of someone you know.

We also support the White Ribbon Campaign which works to end domestic violence and abuse against women and girls.

Town View scheme under way

Town View is a new, £8.54m housing scheme of 54 homes for people aged 55 and over, which is being developed on the site of the former General Hospital in Mansfield.

he site was derelict for about 20 years before the council bought it to re-develop, bringing a long-vacant site back into productive use.

The scheme is made up of 12 two bedroom bungalows, with six of them available as shared ownership homes funded by £126,000 from the Homes and Communities Agency, and 42 one and two bedroom apartments. The bungalows and apartments will all be positioned around a village green setting, providing a pleasant and relaxing environment for residents.

Town View is a mixed needs development, which means that it will offer housing for residents with different requirements, from active older people to those with support and extra care needs. The scheme includes 10 extra care units, funded by £400,000 from Nottinghamshire County Council.

Apart from providing housing, the project will also help local people by organising employment and training opportunities. Those who are interested in a career in construction can contact the council's Employment and Skills adviser, who is

working with Wates Residential, the building partner, to make sure local people benefit from the scheme. For example, Wates Residential is committed to creating apprenticeships and is working with a number of local schools and colleges to give students the chance to learn about the world of construction and improve their employability skills.

The scheme began on site in August 2016. Units will be available for sale or rent from November 2017, ready to move into in early 2018 when the scheme is due to be completed. The project is part of the council's Local Plan to deliver new homes, employment, commercial and community facilities.

Work is well underway to develop 151 modern family homes at Weavers View, the development at Pleasley Hill in Mansfield.

Persimmon Homes is developing the site and work began in June 2015.

A total of 120 homes will be available for sale on the open market with the remaining 31 available through affordable home ownership schemes

More homes to enjoy heating upgrade



Residents of Bellamy Road and Bennington Walk can soon look forward to modern, energyefficient, cost-effective heating in their homes, following the decommissioning of communal district heating.

The council has set aside around £2.500 for each home to convert the domestic heating and make any repairs. According to the National Grid, an average three bedroom semidetached home could save up to £200 a year when switching to individual gas from communal heating.

Private home owners who have bought their properties can have the new heating installed in their homes which they can pay for with a loan, or the cost of the heating upgrade can be paid back to the council when the property is sold. Work begins in April.

ASSIST scheme Adv shortlisted for major award

Mansfield's ASSIST Hospital Discharge Scheme, which has helped reduce 'bed blocking' in the area and saved the NHS more than £1m a year, has been shortlisted for a prestigious national award.

ASSIST has been named in the top four of the Shared Learning Awards 2017 run by the National Institute for Health and Care Excellence (NICE).

The scheme brings together teams from the district council. Nottinghamshire County Council, Sherwood Forest Hospitals NHS Foundation Trust and the Mid Nottinghamshire Clinical Commissioning Group (CCG).

ASSIST involves county council social workers at King's Mill Hospital in Sutton-in-Ashfield identifying patients with a housing or social need and working with Mansfield District Council's housing department to find solutions that enable these patients to leave hospital, with the proper support in place for their return home.

Since its inception in October 2014 up to January 2017, it has helped 2,174 patients.

The project was described by NICE as "particularly impressive."

It is now up against three other entries in the final at the NICE Annual Conference, in Liverpool on 19 May, when the council will give a presentation about its work. The winner will be chosen by the audience.

Evaluation by Mansfield and Ashfield CCG and Nottingham Trent University found clear evidence that the ASSIST scheme saves the NHS £1.371m annually by freeing up beds. The scheme saved an average of 4.5 bed days per patient helped, representing a saving of £936 per patient.


