# 10K a runaway success

Hundreds of people turned out for the Reach Learning Disability's second race around Mansfield town centre.

unners and spectators filled the streets of Mansfield on Sunday 21 August to support the Mansfield 10K for a second year running.

The race, which returned to Mansfield after its premiere in 2015, saw 643 runners pound the streets taking in two laps of the town centre.

Runners included all abilities from amateurs and enthusiasts striving to achieve a personal or charity challenge, to elite athletes aiming for a new personal best.

In 2015, 661 participants helped raise £2,000 for charity. This year, Reach aimed for £5,000 - made up from runner participation fees and additional sponsorship.



### Don't get a fly-tipping offence dumped on you.

ansfield District Council is appealing to residents to ensure that they use reputable and properly registered waste disposal companies to dispose of fridges after a significant increase in fly-tipping around the district.

From 1 April 2016 to 22 June 2016, the authority had 31 cases of dumped fridges compared with 16 in the same period last year.

Residents should not leave fridges in the street for scrap metal collectors without a time and date given for collection as this can be classed as fly-tipping and could result in a prosecution.

Some scrap collectors who pick up white goods in the street are stripping fridges of their valuable parts and illegally dumping the cases.

Residents can take fridges to Mansfield and Warsop recycling sites free of charge. Some retailers also offer a disposal service for fridges when a new one is purchased.

Alternatively, for a fee of £12.25, the council will pick up and dispose of your old fridge.

To tackle fly-tipping, the council runs awareness campaigns to highlight

residents' legal duty of care in the disposal of waste. It is also considering using covert cameras to help catch offenders.

The number of fly-tipping incidents in the district and cost of dealing with them has been steadily increasing for the past three years. Last year the council was left with a £64,000 bill for dealing with 1,335 incidents. This was up from 954 cases in 2013/14.

Director for Communities, Hayley Barsby, said: "This is a cost to Mansfield District Council that we are very keen to reduce in these days of tighter budgets.

"Every resident can play their part in this and by making sure their waste is properly dealt with, they will also ensure they avoid a court summons.

"Protect yourself by using only reputable carriers and taking the contact details and obtaining a receipt from the person who has removed the waste."

The council warns residents to be cautious of using people who advertise on Facebook because often they are not registered waste carriers.

The council successfully prosecuted eight offenders over fly-tipping and issued 54 out-of-court enforcement actions during 2015/16.

Report fly-tipping to the council online at **www.mansfield.gov.uk/reportonline** or call the contact centre on **01623 463463**.

If you come across fly-tipping do not touch it. The council will send an officer out to try to retrieve evidence which could help bring a successful prosecution.

If residents witness fly-tipping taking place:

- Do not approach the person flytipping or tamper with the waste.
- Make a note of the date, time, location of the fly-tipping, what was dumped and a description of the people involved.
- If a vehicle was involved, make a note of the registration number, make, model and colour.

Director for Communities, Hayley Barsby, said:

From September Nottinghamshire residents and their vehicles must be registered to use recycling centres in the county (not Nottingham City). This can be done online at www.nottinghamshire.gov.uk or by calling 0300 500 80 80.

# Are you bin smart?

Help us to improve our recycling rates by putting the right things in the right bin.

to ensure that they are disposing of their waste correctly.

The district creates 13,428 tonnes of recyclable waste, which represents 35 per cent of its total waste.

However, our recycling rate could be much higher and the cost of waste disposal could be cut further if more people followed the local rules on recycling.

If you put the wrong items in your bin

you are at risk of contaminating waste. Contaminated waste accounts for a whopping 15 per cent of Mansfield's recycled waste and can result in tonnes of waste being taken to landfill and incurring landfill tax charges of £100 per tonne.

We aim to reduce our contamination rate to five per cent, but we can only achieve this with your help.



# What's next for Mansfield?

Over the past 15 years regeneration projects in the Mansfield district have attracted £5.6m in funding from the European Union. What effect will Britain's recent decision to leave the EU have on the area's ability to source funding in the future?

hat do the construction of the Mansfield I-Centre, the Queen's Place building and the Mansfield Woodhouse Station Gateway Managed Office space all have in common?

The answer is that they were all partly funded by the European Union, mainly via the European Regional Development Fund (ERDF) programme. Mansfield has benefited from a fair amount of the EU funding over the years. However, the level of this funding has been in decline.

This is mainly because newer EU countries, many from Eastern Europe, have needs that are considered greater than those in the UK, and EU funds are directed to the areas in most need. More than 20 projects have received EU funding in Mansfield including Community Enterprise, Mansfield Market Place Image Enhancements, Mansfield Visitor Interchange and Neighbourhood Business Incubation Units.

The creation of the D2N2 Local Enterprise Partnership (LEP) now has responsibility for distributing EU funding and this is likely to be allocated to schemes that benefit the counties of Derbyshire and Nottinghamshire as a whole.

A reduced amount of EU funding available for physical regeneration will probably be targeted at major projects in the two cities in the D2N2 area.

And this trend is likely to have continued, with or without Brexit.

Chief Executive of Mansfield District Council, Bev Smith, said: "Due to the way in which EU funding is now distributed, the referendum decision probably won't have a significant impact on the council's chances of securing grant support.

"And any funding that has already been pledged for schemes up until 2020, will still be honoured.

"As a council we will be working closely with the D2N2 LEP and Westminster to secure Mansfield's fair share of any funding that is available to us."


# Your vote matters, so don't lose it.

Households should have received an enquiry form asking residents to check if the information that appears on the electoral register for those living at their address is correct.

The aim is to ensure the electoral register is up to date and to identify any residents who are not registered so they can be encouraged to do so.

It is particularly important that anyone who has moved address recently looks out for the form and checks they are registered.

Bev Smith, Chief Executive Officer and Electoral Registration Officer at Mansfield District Council, said: "To make sure you are able to have your say at future elections, simply check the form



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and respond to it as quickly as possible.

"If you're not currently registered, we'll send you information explaining how to do this or you can to apply to register at www.gov.uk/register-to-vote."

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# New campaign on domestic abuse

Could you tell if someone close to you was experiencing domestic abuse? A new campaign in Mansfield aims to help people spot the signs.

new campaign will be running in Mansfield this autumn to help people identify if their friends and family members are experiencing domestic abuse and offer them support.

The pilot project, which will run in September, aims to help residents recognise the warning signs that someone close to them may be experiencing domestic abuse and know how to point them in the direction of services and agencies who could help them.

The trial project focuses on the Oak Tree area of Mansfield, but could be extended to other areas if it proves effective.

The Oak Tree area was chosen because of the strong neighbourhood development work in the community over the past few years, and the varied opportunities for communicating with residents, including via the area's own community website. The local 24-hour domestic abuse helpline 0808 800 0340

Equation, a charity that works in partnership in Nottingham and Nottinghamshire to prevent and reduce domestic abuse, is running the campaign. It will include distribution of digital and print resources that raise awareness of warning signs, and 'how to' guides on positive responses to disclosure of abuse.

People close to survivors of abuse are very well placed to spot the signs of abuse and help their friend or family member access support.

> Equation hopes the campaign will raise the numbers of people accessing the local 24-hour domestic abuse helpline (0808 800 0340), so that more survivors can be offered the help and support they need.

Chloe Cheeseman, Campaigns Coordinator at Equation, said: "Domestic abuse is significantly under-reported to professional support agencies, which means not all survivors are receiving the advice and support they vitally need.

"People close to survivors of abuse are very well placed to spot the signs of abuse and help their friend or family member access support, but at the moment awareness levels amongst the general public of how to respond safely and effectively are quite low.

"Our innovative campaign is designed to give residents the tools and confidence to respond positively and supportively to a friend or family member who is experiencing domestic abuse."

105 is a new, free, national phone number to report or get information about a power cut. You can also report damage to electricity power lines and sub stations.


Dialling 105 will put customers through to their local electricity network operator.

# SM@KING BANNED in play areas

New rules are now in force which are aimed at making our town a safer and more pleasant place to live in, work in and visit.

he new Public Spaces Protection Order now bans smoking of any kind in children's play areas and cycling through the pedestrianised town centre. It requires dog walkers to have the means to pick up dog faeces.

The Order also outlaws the use of and sale of drugs known as 'legal highs' (drugs that are now illegal) as well as other anti-social behaviour, including urinating, defecating or spitting in a public place.

The new powers also enable authorised council staff to:

- Disperse groups if they are causing (or are likely to cause) nuisance, alarm, harassment or distress to any other person in the town centre.
- Order a person to cease drinking or hand over alcohol if they are behaving in an anti-social manner.

 Order a person to put a dog on a lead if the animal is causing or likely to cause a nuisance.

People who ignore the new rules could be handed a  $\pounds100$  fixed penalty notice and up to a  $\pounds1,000$  fine if the case goes to court.

Many areas have been designated 'alcohol free' zones. These areas include the town centre, parks in the district, parts of Meden Vale, Warsop and parts of the Ladybrook, Oak Tree Lane and Ravensdale estates.





These zones do not specifically forbid drinking alcohol but they are areas where if public drinking is causing a nuisance, authorised officers will have the power to order people to stop drinking and to confiscate alcohol.

Director for Communities at Mansfield District Council, Hayley Barsby, said: "We believe the vast majority of people will be supportive of these measures and will abide by them. What we hope the PSPO will do is make Mansfield an even more pleasant, more welcoming and safer place."

# How council scheme saved NHS £1.3m

A council scheme that aims to reduce hospital "bed blocking" in Mansfield and Ashfield has been given a glowing commendation in a new report.

ince 2014, a scheme has been running at King's Mill Hospital in Sutton-in-Ashfield which aims to help patients who could leave hospital if only they had accommodation that was suitable for their ongoing needs.

The ASSIST Hospital Discharge Scheme is a pilot project run by Mansfield District Council in collaboration with Nottinghamshire County Council social services and NHS.

A report by Nottingham Trent University and Mansfield and Ashfield Clinical Commissioning Group (CCG) has concluded that the scheme saves the NHS £1.3m a year by preventing bed blocking and has recommended that there are good financial reasons, as well as clinical and care reasons, for the project to continue.

Bed blocking is a major national issue and an increasingly costly problem for hospitals and NHS as a whole. In May, the National Audit Office published a report which indicated that the number of days in hospitals when beds were occupied by patients, who should have been discharged, had increased by 31 per cent over the past two years to 1.15 million days.

The benefits of the ASSIST scheme, which began in 2014, have been evaluated by Peter Murphy and Dr Donald Harradine, of the University and Ryan Cope, of the CCG, between July 2015 and April 2016.

The scheme works by social workers from the county council identifying patients who have housing issues that are preventing their discharge from hospital and then ASSIST officers from Mansfield District Council working to find a solution.

This could be making adaptations to a patient's home or it could mean that

patients move into temporary supported council housing while a more permanent housing solution is found.

The study found clear evidence that the scheme improves the efficiency of hospital discharge. The annual cost of running the scheme is  $\pounds 340,000$ but the savings to the NHS amount to  $\pounds 1.3m$  annually. The cost of the scheme has so far been carried by the Mid Nottinghamshire Clinical Commissioning Group.

The scheme saved an average of 4.5 bed days per patient helped and this represented a saving of £936 per patient. Between July 2015 and April 2016, the scheme intervened to help 1,127 patients.

Director of Communities at the district council, Hayley Barsby, said: "We really hope the scheme will continue to be funded. The financial benefits for the NHS are indisputable. But there are also many social benefits for the patients involved – and you cannot put a price on that."

#### Mr C is a frail 78-year-old who was admitted to hospital after working in his garden and falling from a ladder.

He had no family and was found to be living alone in his own home but which appeared unfit for habitation. It had no central heating, hot water or indoor toilet, the roof leaked, joists were rotten, ceilings had come down and electrical wiring was in contact with water.

Despite the state of his home, Mr C was reluctant to move out but eventually agreed to go into a respite unit where he looked at an alternative to returning home while work and renovations were undertaken to his home.

He was given priority for a council home and when a suitable property became available, Mr C accepted the accommodation which was near his home and he could oversee any works being done.

# Work starts on £8m housing scheme

Work has begun at the former General Hospital site in Mansfield to provide 54 new homes for people aged 55 plus.

Wates Living Space Homes has been appointed by Mansfield District Council to build the £8.4m Senior Persons Living Scheme. Work began last month (August), with completion due around January 2018.

Director of Communities, Hayley Barsby, said: "This site had been derelict for more than 20 years so it really is going to transform the area and bring a new housing asset to the town.

"There will be some disruption for local residents for a while but bear with us. We will try to keep this to a minimum."

The gated development will provide 42 one-bedroom and two-bedroom apartments with communal facilities and an outdoor terrace. 12 bungalows will be set around a landscaped 'village green'.

Ten of the apartments are for people with extra care needs and will be allocated by Nottinghamshire County Council, which is contributing £400,000 towards the scheme.

Six of the bungalows will be offered for shared ownership with the remaining bungalows and all of the apartments offered for rent.

The Homes and Communities Agency (HCA) is providing £126,000 towards the shared ownership properties.

he £8.4m complex developed and designed by Mansfield District Council, has made the shortlist for Inside Housing's top 60 development awards 2016 in the category of Best Designed Development of the Year.

Director of Communities for Mansfield District Council, Hayley Barsby, said: "We are really proud of this stunning development and our fingers are crossed for success next month at the award ceremony."

The development at the former Brownlow Road aims to provide safe, secure accommodation, to give older people with extra care and support needs the opportunity to live as independently as possible.

The scheme has been developed by the council in partnership with

Nottinghamshire County Council as part of the county council's strategy to improve choice for older adults and provide alternatives to residential care.

Of these homes, 48 are for residents who have extra care needs. Ten homes are bungalows, built around a peaceful courtyard, specifically to support people with dementia.

A long list of features have been included in the design including clear doors on kitchen units, an intercom and a telecare provision that enables sensors to be added into individual homes such as fall detectors. The homes also have level access and wheelchair friendly layouts.

The scheme includes a communal hub which is the focal point for socialising and offers residents a large TV/lounge room, dining area and a Reminiscence Room for smaller group activities.


