am delighted to be leading
Mansfield District Council in
the years ahead and excited by
what lays ahead in the way our
services will be delivered. My aim is
to build a council that is fit for the
future.

Mansfield is improving in many ways and with it your council. But there is a still a lot more work to be done – and there will undoubtedly be some serious financial and social challenges ahead.

The financial challenges are due to the changing way local government is now expected to finance its operations. No longer can local government rely on hefty central government handouts. In Mansfield, central government funding



This means we have to become more self-sufficient and self-financing. As a service provider, we have to become even more efficient. We aim to embrace new technology, for instance, to make it easier for you to pay for and use council services. Look out for more about that later this year.

And it will mean we have to look at how we can work more closely with our



partners to provide services and to focus on the outcome of what we do, rather than the organisations delivering them.

This is already happening – for example in the new community safety hub we are setting up at the Civic Centre which will be looking at the causes of anti social behaviour rather than just dealing with the end crime statistic. This will see the police working alongside our staff at the council, delivering a safer Mansfield.

Over the next few years, I envisage a flexible workforce delivering services regardless of organisational boundaries in this area.

Our performance data shows we already provide high quality services. We want to make them even better by putting our customers firmly at the heart of what we do.

We want to 'start a conversation' with you and there will be an opportunity this year when we will be running a major survey to give you a chance to help improve services for the future.

Please tell us if we are missing the mark but please tell us. too. when we get things right because that feedback is also important to ensure we are all on the right track.

We want the council to do its bit in affecting broader issues facing this area by focusing on priorities such tackling the housing shortage, obesity and debt, and making this area a safer, cleaner and more prosperous place live.

Satisfaction with life is high in Mansfield

Official figures show that people in the Mansfield district are among the most satisfied in England.

Office for National Statistics figures for people being most satisfied with their lives saw Mansfield come in as third best place in England.

Asked to rate their overall life satisfaction out of 10, 32.3% of people in the district gave themselves a nine or ten - just behind the leaders Cornwall (33.3%) and Cumbria (33.2%).

Data was collected over three years and was used to measure the well-being of more than 300,000 people across the UK.

The Home Group's Nottinghamshire Host Families Service is seeking people in Nottinghamshire who can offer a temporary home to a young person aged between 16 and 21.

hen Nottinghamshire student Mollie Challender found she was having problems living with her grandparents, she turned to the charity, Home Group, which helped her out of a difficult family situation and enabled her to continue her studies.

The group has two services for young people: Nightstop provides short-term emergency accommodation, while Supported Lodgings offers longer-term accommodation for up to two years.

The aim is to give young people the opportunity to manage any short-term issues, such as a break down in family relationships, or to enable them to work towards longer-term goals for independent living.

In Mollie's case, Supported Lodgings found her a host family, who were able to offer her a home for 18 months, while she finished her A-levels at a school in Nottinghamshire and go on to university.

Mollie, who is now 20, said: "I had been living abroad with my parents but returned to the UK when I was 15 to study.

The obvious place for me to live was with my grandparents. The generation gap between a normal teenager and parents can be wide, but the difference between me and my grandparents was wider.

At 17, I felt as though I had to move out and that was when I heard of Supported Lodgings run by Home Group.

"I'm really grateful to my hosts. They allowed me to come into their lives and they supported me with university applications. My hosts had children my age so they were more in touch with modern teenagers and I was made to feel really welcome."

"I stayed with them for 18 months while I finished my A-levels and then I left for university. Without them my life could have been very different.

"We both gained from the experience and we still keep in touch and count each other as friends.

"I'd encourage anyone to become a Supported Lodgings host. Not only will they help a young person in a time of need, but they will benefit personally from it and perhaps even make a lifelong friend."

Owners will now have to get their dogs microchipped and registered by law or face fines of £500.

> If a dog is not microchipped, the council's Dog Control Officer may serve a notice for the keeper to have the dog chipped within 21 days and can even take possession of a dog to check if it is chipped or to arrange for the procedure to take place.

All dogs that are over eight weeks old or older and not certified as a working dog will need to be chipped and registered.

Mansfield District Council is offering a microchipping service for just £10 per dog.

Dog Control Officer Mark Berrill said: "Our affordable microchipping service is available to all Mansfield district residents and together we hope we can encourage more people to take responsibility for their pets and reduce the amount of abandoned dogs in our district."

rom 6 April 2016 new legislation means all dog keepers will be required to have their dogs microchipped and registered on one of the authorised databases.

The aim of this is:

- To help reunite strays with their owners
- To help tackle puppy farming
- To encourage responsible ownership

In 2014/15 Mansfield District Council dealt with 622 dogs with half returned to their owners. Of those only 35% were chipped.

The legislation will mean registered dog keepers are more traceable so it is hoped that fewer dogs will be abandoned, mistreated and abused. Non-compliance with the law could see the registered keeper being fined up to £500.

Mansfield District Council has been using Facebook to help reunite / rehome lost dogs in the district.

The authority started the Facebook campaign to engage in conversation with the public about lost and stray dogs in the district.

Every week, dogs are picked up by the Dog Control Officer. The council documents each dog, and posts a picture on the My Mansfield UK Facebook page.

People can like, share and comment on the photo in the hope that the owner can locate their pet.

A month-long campaign was held to clean up Forest Town.

he Tidy Together campaign was sparked by an increase in complaints about litter being dropped by customers of takeaways and shops on the Sandlands Way retail park area.

The action included community litter picks, promotional banners and posters warning people that they could be fined for dropping litter, and campaign stickers for food cartons, carrier bags and bins, and coffee cup wraps.

Council neighbourhood wardens also patrolled the area to catch litter droppers and issue them with £75 penalty notices. In all, 25 were issued over the month.

Schools and community groups were also encouraged to support the campaign by organising litter picks, designing posters and stickers, and by signing up for training as a champion of the area.

A number of businesses, including Asda, Costa Coffee, KFC, Shine Dental Surgery, Jango's, Fillets and Foxglove, supported the campaign and pledged to improve their own litter picking operations, dispose of their trade waste responsibly and report any environment crimes on the retail park. such as fly-tipping, litter dropping and dog fouling.

Town 'cleans for the Queen'

Volunteers and community groups took to the streets of Mansfield earlier this month to take part in a national Clean for the Queen project.

The scheme was called the biggest ever clean-up of the UK and was to help mark the Queen's 90th birthday.

Schools, community groups, businesses and volunteers were encouraged to

get involved in litter picks and clean ups around the district.

Among those who took part were Eastlands Junior School, Corner House care home for disabled adults, waste company Veolia, Maun Conservation Group and Warsop Allotment & Leisure Gardeners Association (pictured).

The Mansfield District Council competition is open to all residents and schools in the district and there will be cash prizes for the top three entries in each of the two categories -Best Kept Garden (front, back or combined) and Best School Garden.

Judging will take place from 18 July to 12 August 2016 and results will be announced in late August. Winners will be invited to the Mansfield BID Garden Festival held in early September for the presentation of certificates and prizes.

The judges will be looking at the following criteria:

- Overall design and appearance
- Choice and quality of plants to give all year round interest
- Health of plants (free from pests and diseases)
- Cleanliness and tidiness of the garden
- Lack of weeds
- Plants that attract birds and insects
- Evidence of environmentally friendly gardening techniques
- Water conservation (mulch, ground cover and water recycling).

Council tax frozen – for sixth year!

For sixth year Mansfield **District Council has frozen** its council tax levy.

This has been possible to achieve despite a 13% cut in central government funding, from £4.645m last year to £4.034m.

We needed to find £3m in order to balance the budget. This was accomplished through the use of reserves and through savings, achieved without an impact on frontline services.

Among the savings was a reorganisation of senior management at the council.

Since 2010/11, central government funding has fallen from £10m to £4m. By 2020 this figure will be just £2.7m a 71.4% reduction since 2010.

In order to achieve more self-sufficiency, the council has ahead of it a programme of increased commercialisation and will be looking at new models of working and providing services, including a drive to work more closely with its partners in health, education, and the police.

long with Government grants and, in some cases, charges for services, Council Tax helps to pay for local services provided by these organisations.

The total Council Tax bill for Mansfield District residents was finalised earlier this month. Full details are published on our website www.mansfield.gov.uk/ counciltax.

The Council Tax you pay is based on the type of property you live in. Properties are in eight bands.

Council Tax Reductions

Residents on a low income or who receive certain welfare benefits may be able to claim a 90% reduction on their Council Tax bill. Some pensioners could claim a 100% reduction.

Households with one adult occupier are entitled to a 25% discount.

If there are two or more adults in the household, you may still qualify for a discount if one of the occupiers:

- is a full-time student, student nurse or apprentice
- has a severe learning disability
- is a young adult who is still eligible for child benefit, or
- is a full-time carer looking after someone.

Disabled people

If your household includes a person with a disability you may be entitled to an adjustment on your Council Tax valuation band. If your home is already in the lowest band, you will still get a reduction.







Facing debt?

Nottingham Credit is an ethical not for profit lending organisation that has been operating in the Mansfield area for more than seven years, providing low cost loans to people who find it hard to get credit through traditional routes.

o you are facing debts you cannot pay... First, don't panic - there is always a solution!

Work out how much you owe and what rates of interest you are on, then book an appointment with the Citizens' Advice Bureau to work out a debt management plan. They may well point you towards Nottingham Credit Union to help you out of a tight spot.

The organisation is owned and run by its members and operates in Mansfield from 3 Clumber Street. It opens Tuesdays, Thursdays and Fridays from 10-2pm.

Anyone who lives or works in Nottinghamshire can use the Credit Union's services but it differs from other lenders because it will also offer loans to people with a poor credit history, to those on benefits, or who may have had money problems in the past and to whom other banks will not lend.

It differs, too, because it does not charge application fees or early repayment fees, and offers a one-to-one service tailored to a person's needs and circumstances.

"This is banking with a heart." said Marie Haywood, Mansfield Branch Manager of the Nottingham Credit Union. "Our customers are real people, not targets or profit margins. We consider all loan applications on an individual basis so anyone can apply.

"We are a cheaper alternative to door step lenders and payday lenders. We promote responsible lending, charge fair interest rates, there are no sneaky fees, and we do not lend more than people can afford to repay."

Andy Stowe has been a volunteer at Nottingham Credit Union for three years. He turned to them after using door step lenders for 15 years. He said: "It felt like I was on a roundabout with nowhere to get off - my debts were out of control.

"After a chat with the Nottingham Credit Union, a plan was arranged and my debts were consolidated into an affordable loan. Now I am able to save on a regular basis and I even have cash in my pocket to spend, all thanks to the individual and friendly service at the Nottingham Credit Union.

"I now volunteer as I want to help other people. Please don't bury your head in the sand. Come and see us for a friendly chat."

National Living Wage

On 1 April 2016 the **National Living Wage** (NLW) will become law. This means that workers aged 25 and over who are not in the first year of an apprenticeship will be legally entitled to the new minimum pay rate of £7.20 per hour.

The NLW is compulsory and only applies to people aged 25 and above. Its calculation is based on national earnings. The National Minimum Wage will continue to apply to workers aged 18 to 24.



MDC's Planning Policy team has just completed a busy six-week consultation period, with 23 events around the district, to inform people about the Local Plan and to seek views on how the district should develop over the next 17 years.



ore than 540 people attended the Local Plan consultation events and now the council team is looking at how to respond to concerns raised and what changes should be made to the Plan.

Once agreed, the council will produce a consultation response document for everyone to see.

At that time the planning team will make further adjustments to the Local Plan and by the end of the year, it is expected that the council will be moving to the next stage: the "Publication Draft Local Plan".

This will give the public another opportunity to comment on the Plan and these comments will go forward to be considered by an independent planning inspector.

The Local Plan, aims to allocate provision for:

- 7,520 new homes
- 42 hectares of new industrial land
- More new offices
- Retail development in Mansfield town centre and the district centres
- New infrastructure, services and facilities

Patients' housing project up for top award

A Mansfield District Council housing scheme that allows patients to leave King's Mill Hospital in Sutton-in-Ashfield earlier to free up beds has been shortlisted for a major national award.

The ASSIST Hospital Discharge scheme. run in collaboration with the health service and Nottinghamshire County Council, is in the final of the health and social care category of the Local Government Chronicle awards, to be decided this month.

Patients who may benefit from the scheme are identified in hospital by nurses and social workers who organise care and

support for them and refer them to ASSIST to support their discharge from hospital.

This is usually to their own homes after minor adaptations have been made. But it could also be a move into one of four temporary MDC homes funded by Nottinghamshire County Council.

The project helps more than 60 people a month and is set to save the NHS around £1.3m a year by reducing the delays for discharging patients from hospital as a result of their circumstances or because their home is unsuitable.

Start-up boost for businesses

If your business could do with a financial boost to help it grow or you need help to launch a new enterprise, you could get support from Mansfield District **Council Business Grants** Scheme.

One company that has taken advantage is Pleasley-based bridal boutique, The Wedding HQ.

The company was given a helping hand with a £1,000 Business Start Up grant which can be used for costs such as the purchase of machinery and equipment, business stationery, advertising and website design.

Lauren Troman-Green, who runs The Wedding HQ with sister-in-law Suzie Troman-Green. said: "We're so grateful for this financial boost. As with most businesses starting out, there are massive financial outlays to be made at the outset."

Media drive

Local media partners will be working with stallholders to promote seasonal items. offers and deals.

Mansfield 103.2 plans to broadcast live from the market at least three days a week from the start of April.

Tony Delahunty, director of the local radio station, said: "Live broadcasts will come from the heart of the market. Our reporters will be talking to traders about what they are selling whether that's fruit and veg, clothing, flowers or a tray of mushy peas.

"We want to be supporting traders as much as we can to get their message out there to local shoppers."

There will also be daily posts on Facebook and Instagram to spread the word about offers and products plus more traditional advertising such as billboards and bus backs to give the market, entertainment and special events that extra promotional boost.

A new layout

The plan is to push fresh produce to the front of the market along the key entry points to the market square. Traders with a long history in Mansfield will be given priority when allocating pitches in busy areas.

There will be a new food court area with new tables and chairs and a performance area in front of the Old Town Hall.

Local artists will be encouraged to perform there for free. They will need to book and pay a refundable deposit to use the performance area.

The history of Mansfield market goes back more than 700 years but times are a-changing with traders now facing much more competition. Next month a relaunch with more stalls, bags of choice and a pocketful of change will aim to put the market back on your shopping list.

ext month sees the start of a new era for Mansfield Market. An official launch of the market transformation will be held on Saturday 9 April with live music, performances by Covent Garden entertainment.

But the new-look market will kick off at the beginning of April when the town's West Gate stalls will join traders in the market square to provide one big market for shoppers.

It's just one of a series of changes being made in Mansfield District Council's ambitious plan to put market trading back on the map and in the heart of the town centre.

The aim is that by concentrating stalls in one place it will help to create a critical mass, and drive footfall to the heart of the town centre.

Confidence booster for

New traders, more products and a better choice for customers are vital to the success of the market relaunch.

In coming up with a transformation plan, the council researched 29 other markets across the country to work out how to put the Mansfield's market back on the shopping list of local people.

Stalls will have new canopies as part of the transformation and

traders will wear name badges and have signs to show their trading name. The aim is to give traders maximum exposure while increasing buyer confidence in purchasing from stalls.

Fundamentally the transformation of the market is about changing shopping habits and encouraging more people to support the local economy by shopping locally and buying from local traders.

There will be special markets including the International Street Market in June, plus monthly car boot and country produce sales. Details coming on social media soon.

Celebrations of national events including Armed Forces Day, the Queen's 90th Birthday, World Food Day and Love Your Local Market week.

And that's not all that will be changing. The plan is for the market place to be used more often for events and entertainment.

To make this achievable, the market stalls themselves are being modified so that they can be easily moved and the market place cleared.

The council is working with the Mansfield Business Improvement District (BID) and other interested partners on a plan that will see the market place being used more frequently for events to draw in the crowds.

plea to teens

Mansfield's Youth Mayor, Jake Baldry, 16, has appealed to young people to ensure they register to vote.

Although people can vote only once they have reached the age of 18, all 16 and 17-year-olds should also register to vote so that they are sent a polling card should they reach 18 by the day of the election.

"It is such a simple procedure and so important for democracy," he said. "If young people want politicians to do things to help young people then we have to let them know that we have a voice and voting helps us to be heard and our views to be considered.



Among teenagers who have recently registered is Josh Peck, of Warson. a customer services apprentice at Mansfield District Council, who said: "The signing up process was so easy and took literally minutes. What do you have to lose? It is such a simple procedure and it could affect your future."



Are you registered to vote yet? If not you may miss out on the chance to cast your vote in upcoming elections, including a national referendum on the EU.

here are two chances to use your vote coming up in the next few months, so make sure you are registered in time or you could lose the opportunity to have your say.

The first election is on Thursday 5 May when you will be able to vote for the county's next Police and Crime Commissioner (PCC).

Then on Thursday 23 June, the nation is scheduled to make an important decision about whether or not to remain part of the European Union.

Polling cards for the PCC election will be sent out in April and these will tell you which polling station to use locally to cast your vote. You can also opt to vote by post.

The election of the PCC uses the supplementary vote system if there are more than two candidates - the same system used to elect Mansfield's Executive Mayor. If there are only two candidates, it will be run using the "first past the post" system.

The EU referendum is expected to be a simple 'leave' or 'remain' choice.

You can only vote in these two ballots if you are listed on the Electoral Register. For the PCC election, that must be done by Monday 18 April. For the EU referendum, the deadline is likely to be Tuesday, 7 June.

You can register to vote by visiting www.gov.uk/register-to-vote. You will need your National Insurance number to hand.

PCC election votes will be counted and results announced on Friday 6 May.

The result will be announced at www.rushcliffe.gov.uk/PCCelection and on social media. It will also be posted on Mansfield District Council's website and social media on 6 May.

Who can vote for PCCs?

You can vote in Nottinghamshire PCC election if you are registered to vote by 18 April and are:



- a British citizen living in the UK or registered to vote as a crown servant or member of the armed services
- a European Union citizen living in

ansfield's new state-of-theart CCTV system is due to be fully operational next month.

The district council is replacing its old fibre optic system with a modern wireless system. The upgrade is costing £524,000 and was needed because much of the council's equipment

was becoming obsolete.

The new system should pay for itself within six years by reducing optic fibre rental and maintenance costs and through raising money by offering a paid-for CCTV service to local businesses and other organisations.

This round-the-clock service covers CCTV monitoring and data storage facility which is linked directly to the police, our own neighbourhood Wardens, and the shop and pubwatch radio schemes.

The council can provide a bespoke paid-for service and any organisations interested in this, should call the Operations Manager on **01623 463085**.

The new wi-fi system allows for a flexible service which will be extended with permanent or temporary cameras placed in previously uncovered parts of the district in the future.

Currently the district council is agreeing a clear and transparent method of deciding where new cameras will be sited based on evidence of need and on if camera is the most appropriate response to a problem. We then assess whether or not it is technically possible to erect a camera in a particular location.

> Residents cannot directly request CCTV in their area but if they report issues to the police or council, we may be able to use these reports to build up a profile of an area and assess which areas to prioritise for action.

Work to upgrade the old system began last year and has included. replacing some cameras, erecting wireless signal poles in parks and open spaces, and refurbishing the control room with energy efficient monitors, a new IT system and a new recording system.

The wider aim in having a new system is that it will help to detect and reduce crime and anti-social behaviour and encourage inward investment and a revitalisation of town centres and neighbourhoods in the district. creating an improved climate for job creation and growth.

Joined up ommunity

A new community safety hub is set to open later this year at Mansfield Civic Centre.

The hub will bring together teams from Nottinghamshire Police and Mansfield District Council's community safety department to provide a joined up approach to dealing with crime, disorder and safety issues.

"This is a really positive step for community policing and safety across Mansfield district," said Chief Inspector Neil Williams, of Nottinghamshire Police.

"Having our teams together makes sense, it will improve communications and allow us to work more closely together."

The move to a shared resource follows a national trend and there are other similar partnership hubs already in Nottinghamshire.

The hub is being set up on the ground floor of the Civic Centre. Community safety officers will continue to have a presence in Warsop.

rom Easter. Mansfield will have a new indoors attraction for youngsters, with the opening of a new soft play area at the Water Meadows.

The two-tier play facility is aimed at families with children aged under 12 years and will be open from 10am to 6pm Monday to Friday and from 9am to 4pm on Saturday and Sunday.

Among its features are:

A twin lane wavy open slide

- A 'walk of fear'
- Electronic walk-on piano
- Ropes and rollers
- Separate toddler area
- Twin lane toddler slide
- Toddler 'hidey hole' with mirrors

It will cost £3 per child for an 'open' ticket with no time limit. with a discounted rate of £2 per child when bought with a swimming ticket. There will be concessionary rates for those who qualify and no charge for accompanying adults.

The area will be made available for group activities and pre-booked parties. Party rates, inclusive of a dedicated party area and party leader are £6.50 per child.

Funding for the scheme was agreed last year, with £140,000 coming from Mansfield District Council and £70,000 from the Mansfield District Leisure Trust, which is the charity formed to run leisure centres in the Mansfield district.

The soft play area and café will complement the existing leisure pool play facilities, and the café will provide a social space for all users of the centre.

New family council houses for town

The Council appointed contractor, GEDA Construction Ltd, in March last year and they started on site in May, building seven two-bedroom properties and five three-bedroom properties in Pye Avenue.

The council is expecting the properties to be completed around late spring this year.

Grants to help independent living

Over the past ten months 39 private homeowners across the Mansfield district have had their home adapted to allow them

to live independently, thanks to a grant from Mansfield District Council.

isabled Facilities Grants (DFGs) help to pay for essential adaptations to make it easier for disabled residents to get into and around their home, make their home safer, make it easier to use the bathroom and kitchen and to adapt heating and lighting controls.

The grants, available to help the most vulnerable people in the district, can be used to provide equipment such as stair-lifts, ceiling track hoists, through floor lifts, accessible shower facilities and wash and dry toilets.

To be eligible a resident must:

- be disabled
- either own their own home or rent from a private landlord or housing association
- have difficulty managing daily living
- be assessed by an Occupational Therapist (OT) as having a need

If they live in council-owned or housing association property they may still be able to get adaptations subject to an OT assessment.

The OT service will assess their needs and may recommend what equipment and/or adaptations are needed.

If a DFG is needed, the OT service will inform Mansfield District Council which work is necessary. A financial assessment will also be carried out to see what, if any, contribution should be made by the resident.

Mansfield District Council has been shortlisted for a prestigious housing award.

The authority is down to the last six in the category of Outstanding Local Authority of the Year in the Chartered Institute of Housing UK Housing Awards. The winner will be announced on 26 April.

This category is open to any local authority and recognises the role of councils in shaping local housing

markets. This could be through regeneration or development, meeting local housing need and/or preventing homelessness.

In its application, the council cited its current house building programme which consists of 171 new homes, with 83 due in 2015/16. 34 in 2016/17 and 54 in 2017/18.

Most of this programme is to build housing for older people which can enable council tenants to downsize and free up under-occupied larger houses for families on the council waiting list. It also includes the Poppy Fields scheme for people with extra care and support needs.

ansfield District Council's extra care scheme -Poppy Fields - in the former Brownlow Road, is nearing completion.

Although later than anticipated, the scheme is expected to be completed in March.

The county council has nomination rights into the scheme which means that if they think a person is suitable to live at Poppy Fields, they can carry out an assessment and refer the person to the district council.

Also completing in the spring is Phase 2 of Poppy Fields. This phase will offer 20 more properties to rent for older people (apartments and bungalows) and will be advertised by the council's Homefinder Service on its website nearer completion.

Tenants move in to bungalow scheme

The Flint Avenue scheme opened November 2015 and the 17 bungalows are now fully occupied.

At the same time as building the homes, the council took the opportunity to upgrade the community centre so that it could be fully accessible by people in wheelchairs and landscaped the remaining open space.

The open space incorporates a trim trail with outdoor fitness equipment suitable for use by older people and wheelchair users.

Many dog walkers now use the open space, too, but the council is getting reports of people not picking up their dogs' mess.

Special bins are being installed at the site to help owners dispose of the waste. If dog walkers are caught not picking it up their pet's waste, they could face a fixed penalty notice of £75.

New rules for landlords

A new requirement has come into force for private landlords to check the immigration status of prospective tenants and lodgers before they move in, to avoid liability for a civil penalty.

If a landlord rents to an illegal migrant and has not carried out a correct right to rent check, they could be liable to a civil penalty. The penalty is up to £3,000 per tenant.


