The council's Antisocial Behaviour (ASB) team continues to play a major role in tackling town centre issues.

They work closely with colleagues and partners to ensure all possible help has been offered while also gathering evidence and serving enforcement notices to those who continue causing problems.

But this is far from all they deal with on a daily basis.

ASB Officer Becky said: "I've been in this role for about six months and I love every minute. It's really interesting and each day is different.

"One minute we can be offering advice in neighbour disputes, giving evidence in court cases, carrying out welfare assessments and enforcement at unauthorised traveller sites, and the next we can be working with prolific offenders to ensure they access appropriate support services."

They also work closely with social services, schools, the police and youth service to prevent children from becoming involved in ASB and intervene at an early stage if they do.

Becky said: "It's a really good example of partnership working and it's fantastic knowing that we are making a positive difference to our most vulnerable people for the benefit of everyone."

Mansfield District Council's element of Council Tax has been frozen for the ninth consecutive year.




Thanks to our innovation and transformation, you will pay no more for our services in 2019/20 than you did back in 2010/11.


This is despite the money we receive from Central Government going down from $\pounds10.4m$ to $\pounds3.6m$

How Band A Council Tax is calculated:

These figures provided are for a Band A property, which is the lowest, as most properties in Mansfield are in this band. If you live in Warsop, you'll pay an additional £22.85 for parish council services.



Mansfield District Council collects Council Tax on behalf of other authorities but for every $\pounds 1$ collected, only 9.26p comes to this council.

Growth

Planning for The fullure

Growth is vital to meet the needs of our residents and businesses and for the future prosperity and success of our district.

The forthcoming Mansfield Local Plan will be a key driver for change and will assist the ongoing transformation of Mansfield in becoming a place of choice, where people are proud to live. It will encourage neighbourhoods to be well connected to places of work, education and recreation.

Over the last five years, an average of 311 homes have been built per year in the district, against a target of 279 a year.

There are currently 3,812 homes (as of October 2018) that have been granted planning permission across the district. This includes the 1,700 homes being built, along with a local centre, shops,

offices and green spaces, at Berry Hill, Mansfield. There have been approvals for 430 homes and nine hectares of employment land at Penniment Farm alongside the Mansfield and Ashfield Regeneration Route (MAAR) and construction has begun on the first phase, comprising 202 dwellings.

The Local Plan, which makes provision for further new homes, including 925 at Pleasley Hill and 800 off Jubilee Way, is in its final stages. It has been submitted to the Secretary of State for examination before its adoption later this year.

Rented homes at old brewery

The council helped facilitate the redevelopment of the old Mansfield Brewery site, which was derelict for 15 years. Wise Living has started work to build 75 one to four-bedroom homes for rent. The company was able to take this scheme forward after the council agreed to significantly reduce the land charges attached to the site.

Executive housing



Mansfield Homes Ltd is helping to tackle the district's shortage of executive homes by building 23 four and five-bedroom houses on surplus council land near Carr Bank Park.

The Wildflower Rise scheme is the first project of the council's development company and is expected to **raise £900,000** to help pay for council services.



New council homes for rent

We plan to build about 150 council homes over the next five years. The proposed sites include Rosemary Avenue, Newark Way, Newark Close and Newark Drive, Bellamy Road and Sandy Lane. The council has also created eight one-bedroom flats by converting former office space in Shireoaks Enterprise Centre.

Boost for first-time buyers

Help is at hand for first-time buyers who want to get on the housing ladder.

The council is working with Mansfield Building Society to enable people to buy a home for £130,000-£170,000 with only a 2.5% deposit – meaning a deposit of £3,750 would be needed for a £150,000 home instead of the usual £7,500.

An interest-free loan is also available from the council, once the purchase has been completed, to help with new home expenses. Terms and conditions apply.

Grants aid growth

In order to support our local businesses across Mansfield, we offer a range of grants. Since the grant scheme's launch in 2015, 97 grants, totalling £239,800, have been awarded – helping to create 133 full-time and eight part-time jobs. Nursery takes on new bright spark



Bright Sparks Private Day Nursery on Derby Road, Mansfield, was awarded a £1,500 grant to support apprentices including Kathleen Dickens, who has since secured a full-time job at the nursery. Kath completed a Level three NVQ in Early Years and Childcare.

Laura Gapski, the nursery principal, said the grant had helped enormously, 'allowing us to sustain the employment of recruits beyond their initial training'. The nursery was recently graded by OFSTED as outstanding in every category for the third time.

Gaining an advantage

Established in 2005, Advantage Engineering Solutions Ltd built such a strong customer base that by 2017, it had outgrown its premises. It identified a bigger base in Mansfield Woodhouse and received a business growth grant from the council, which helped fund new equipment, the installation of an electrical system and the construction of an office at the new premises on Old Mill Lane Industrial Estate. Since moving, the business has gone from strength to strength and last year won the Chad's Small Business of the Year award.

Centre of attention!

Work is ongoing to help improve key parts of Mansfield town centre to encourage more visitors and shoppers into the area and help make Mansfield a destination that people are proud in which to live, work, invest and visit.



Old bus station site

The council is continuing to work with development company ARBA to secure a hotel operator for the former bus station site at Stockwell Gate North.

The key gateway site is being proactively marketed and negotiations are progressing with national hotel, food and drinks operators. It is estimated that based on Visit England's national average 70 per cent double occupancy level, an 80-bed hotel could welcome up to 41,000 visitors a year, as well as create 50-60 jobs. The boost to the local economy could be £3.6m a year, based on a typical overnight spend of £170.

Town View

Our over-55s housing scheme is now open and the tenants are delighted with their new homes on the site of the old general hospital, which lay derelict for more than 20 years. The development, near the town centre, has seen 54 apartments and bungalows built, in a secure gated scheme. It includes a landscaped 'village green' with a trim trail, plus a community lounge and kitchen.

Town View complements the Poppy Fields extra care scheme on Chesterfield Road South in the provision of high quality accommodation for older people.



Old Town Hall

Work is well underway on a £1.4m refurbishment of the Old Town Hall, to create shop units, offices and a function room that will be available to hire. It will bring this historic Grade II* listed building back into full use again for the first time in 30 years.

Townscape Heritage Project

Property owners can now apply for improvement grants in the Mansfield

Townscape Heritage Project to restore key buildings in parts of Leeming Street, the Market Place and Stockwell Gate. Owners of identified properties can apply for match-funded grants of 75 per cent to help with the cost of making improvements in sympathy with the property's heritage. The scheme, funded by the National Lottery Heritage Fund, has a pot of nearly £850,000 available to help improve the area.

Walkden Street car park

The multi-storey car park is currently undergoing work to replace old concrete panels on the outside of the building with a decorative metal facade. The work was needed after the integrity of the external panels began to cause safety concerns. The £2.4m scheme will also improve the approach of this key site in Mansfield town centre.

Turn over a new leaf

We collected more than 5,629 tonnes of compostable garden waste last year, which was turned into valuable plant food rather than going to waste in landfill.

Our fortnightly Garden Waste Service costs just £30 a year in Mansfield and saves you the hassle and mess of taking your grass cuttings, small branches, plants, hedge trimmings and leaves to the tip.

The brown bin service, which runs all year round (monthly from December to February), costs the same no matter what time of year you sign up – so sign up now to make sure you get the most for your money.

If you already pay by Direct Debit, you don't need to do anything to continue receiving this service. If you paid in any other way last year or are a new customer then you need to visit www.mansfield.gov.uk/

gardenwaste to sign up. The quickest and easiest way to pay is by annual direct debit, which will ensure your service continues into 2020/21 without disruption. You can also make a one-off debit/credit card payment online.

If you want to pay at a Post Office or PayPoint, you need to sign up as a new customer online first and select PayPoint as your payment type. Print off or save the barcode to your phone or device and take with you when you pay.

We encourage residents to help family and friends who need help signing up.

Mind your Parking

Please be considerate when you park your vehicle on the road. Our crews will always try their best, but if our bin lorries cannot access a street due to a blocked junction or double parking, then bins will not be emptied. If we can't empty your bin due to access problems or severe weather, leave it out and we'll come back to it as soon as possible.

Thanks to new in-cab technology no printed bin stickers are needed this year. Instead, you need to put your house number on your bin and our crews will know which bins have been paid for.

Be bin smart

- Make sure your bin is not overloaded. Bins that are too heavy will not be emptied.
- Recyclable waste must not be put in the green or brown bins.
- Only extra recyclable side waste can be taken on blue bin days.
- No extra side waste can be taken on green bin days.
- Garden waste should be placed in the brown bin if you have one.
- If your blue bin is contaminated, any incorrect materials must be removed before your next collection.

- Glass bottles, jars, clothing and textiles can be put in bottle and textile banks around the district.
- Take any builders' rubble, paint, electrical items and excess general waste to the county council's recycling centres.
- Put your bin out by 6.30am for collection and back in by 12noon the day after collection.
- We are only able to collect bins supplied by Mansfield District Council.

Failure to comply with waste collection requirements may result in a written warning being issued and you may be required to pay a fixed penalty, under Section 46A of the Environmental Protection Act 1990.



nansfieldmuseum 100 years of Old Mansfield

To mark the centenary this year of the Old Mansfield Society, members have mounted a special exhibition at the museum. And due to its popularity, the exhibition is being extended until Saturday 1 June.

Featuring rare photos, videos and objects of places and people central to the development of the town over the past 100 years, it provides an intriguing glimpse into a vanished world.

Reprints of books and articles, by members past and present, help tell the story, under headings such as sport, health care and education.

The society was set up after the First World War by local people who were concerned about the destruction of historical buildings and artefacts in the town. Ever since, its aim has been to preserve as accurate a record of local history as possible.

More than a museum...

Mansfield Museum is so much more than the exhibitions it stages.

Hundreds of visitors also flock to the venue for a variety of events and happenings from markets to arts and crafts lessons. During school holidays it lays on low-cost and free events and the May half-term sees a daily programme of children's activities.

If you or a relative are coping with memory loss, there is the monthly Reminiscence Tea Room with free tea and cake and interesting memorabilia to trigger memories of past times. The next sessions are from 2.30pm to 4pm on the following Wednesdays: 15 May, 19 June, 17 July, 21 August and 18 September.

The museum will host a valuations expert from Bamfords, of Derby, who will be able to tell you how much those treasures in your loft are worth. They will be at the museum from 1pm to 3pm on the following Mondays: 13 May, 3 June, 1 July, 5 August and 2 September.

The programme is completely free of charge and run at different times and venues across the area. Nottinghamshire GP, Dr James Hopkinson said: "Type 2 diabetes is a leading cause of blindness, kidney disease and foot amputations and doubles your risk of heart attacks and strokes.



"Whilst Type 1 cannot be prevented and is not linked to lifestyle, Type 2 is largely preventable through lifestyle changes.

"Although people may feel completely well, it is really important to take action to reduce your risk of developing Type 2 diabetes by joining the 'Healthier You' programme".

More than 8,000 people in the East Midlands have already taken part in the programme and by making a few simple adjustments to their lifestyle many have seen some really positive results and are no longer at risk of diabetes. Anyone who has received a referral from their GP to the programme and now wishes to participate should call **0800 321 3150**.

PARK IMPROVEMENTS

Improvements have been made to footpaths and access points, along with tree planting in Larkhills Green Space, off Holly Road, Forest Town, using £14,800 in funding from a new housing development close to the green space.

Another £8,800 has been spent on Jackson's Field, off Mill Street, Mansfield, on new seats, picnic benches, litter bins and signs plus new trees, including a community orchard bordered by 'edible hedging'.

We have planted 104 large standard trees and 2,300 whips (small trees) over the past year as part of ongoing efforts to make Mansfield cleaner and greener.
