Change is coming Foreword

Welcome to the latest edition of MyMansfield which is full of positive news about the district.

Change is coming into view in Mansfield in more ways than one. Our strategy for the town centre is starting to take shape with the planning application now in for Mansfield Connect. our multiagency civic hub scheme that will breathe new life into the heart of our district

Figures show our town centre is bouncing back with increased visitor numbers and new enterprises opening and investing in this area

Our vibrant events timetable promises to bring even more visitors here in the coming months. Meanwhile dozens of affordable council homes for rent are on the way this year on the Bellamy estate and at the Poppy Fields development.

We still have challenges though. Funding remains tight for councils across the country and is resulting in higher council tax bills for residents. But remember that the increase from Mansfield District Council makes up only 8% of your bill. This means most

households will pay just £2.65 a week for a huge array of local services over the year - from keeping your local theatre and museum open, maintaining over 150 parks and open spaces, and providing 24/7 CCTV around the district, to collecting waste from 50,000 households.

We also face the new challenge of local government reorganisation. We will be fighting for our communities best interests in these discussions There's still much work to be done and this is unlikely to take effect until 2028, so it's business as usual taking Mansfield forward. I'm confident we will come through any reforms with renewed vigour, and a determination guided by a set of clear priorities to continue to improve the quality of life here.

Council's call on government to save social housing

An unprecedented cross-party coalition of over 100 council landlords jointly published five solutions for the government to 'secure the future of England's council housing'.

They warned England's council housing system is broken and that urgent action is needed. Mansfield District Council is one of the 100 signatories to the report.

The five solutions and practical

recommendations to the new government: 1.A new fair and sustainable HRA model

- including an urgent £644m one-off rescue injection, and long-term, certain rent and debt agreements.
- 2. Reforms to unsustainable Right to Buy policies
- 3. Removing red tape on existing funding
- 4. A new, long-term Green & Decent Homes Programme
- 5. Urgent action to restart stalled building projects, avoiding the loss of construction sector capacity and a market downturn

Town centre spruced up!

Local businesses joined forces with Mansfield District Council for a day of action to spruce up the town centre. More than 170 activities were carried out, including painting, weeding, cleaning, and tidying, to enhance the appearance and ambience. The environmental health team tackled waste, flytipping and other environmental issues, and the community safety team targeted antisocial behaviour. The day was organised by Mansfield BID and the council and another one is planned on 2 April 2025.

Ladybrook war memorial given makeover

The Ladybrook war memorial has been given a much-needed makeover thanks to the Immediate Justice scheme. The initiative allows residents to identify public spaces that can be cleaned up by people doing community reparation.

Three service users took part in this meaningful community effort, working hard to trim hedges,

pick up litter, jet wash the memorial itself, and tidy up the surrounding area, leaving it looking completely transformed. This effort was the result of a public referral made through the new 'Fix My Street' website – the first of its kind since the service went live.



The platform enables residents to highlight areas in need of attention, allowing offenders who have committed antisocial behaviour to make amends by carrying out vital community reparation within days of their offence.

Whether it's cleaning up graffiti, picking up litter, or restoring community spaces, these tasks help service users see the positive impact they can have when they engage constructively with their surroundings. New play equipment for Manor park

New outdoor gym equipment, aimed at teenagers and adults, has been installed at Manor Park.

The equipment was funded by £12,000 from a Section 106 planning agreement from a residential development off Park Hall Road and £15,000 from an application submitted by the Friends of Manor Park group to the Mansfield Community Grant Fund.

The new equipment is next to the existing play area and features a number of inclusive pieces of equipment suitable for the disabled and mobility impaired.

The council will also be installing three new picnic benches adjacent to the play area in the coming weeks.





Celebrating district's global connections



by the community safety team

A week-long crackdown on unlicensed scrap metal collectors in Mansfield has seen rogue traders fined and vehicles seized.

Our Community Protection Officers launched the blitz after intelligence about an increase in scrap metal thefts and unlicensed operators.

They conducted proactive patrols and carried of checks on various vans and flatbed trucks in the district. Three operators, one in Ladybrook and two in Mansfield Woodhouse, were issued with £400 Fixed Penalty Notices for failing to produce or operating without waste carrier licences issued by the Environment Agency. One van was impounded on behalf of the DVLA for having no road tax and the other two were seized, with support from the local police, for having no insurance. The police will pursue any criminal charges relating to these. The owner of the untaxed vehicle will now need to pay the road tax to the DVLA and a recovery fee to reclaim the vehicle.



Step back in time on the high street

Primary schools are being invited to sign up for a free two-hour workshop on the history of shopping in Mansfield.

Vikings to Victorians – A History of Shopping! can be delivered in schools and is being offered as part of the Mansfield's Townscape Heritage Project to the first five schools which apply.

The workshop is aimed at children aged 7 to 11 and combines a 30-minute visual presentation on the history and development of shopping in Mansfield followed by a hands-on art and technology session.

Pupils will be able to explore Victorian and Georgian interior architectural styles, and make a collage mood board for the interior and exterior of their own imaginary shop. All materials are provided.

The five workshops are made possible with support from The National Lottery Heritage Fund and can be delivered on a Monday or Tuesday during March. To request a workshop email the Regeneration team on **regeneration@mansfield.gov.uk**.

Aladdin is a fly away success!

Mansfield Palace Theatre are celebrating the success of another record-breaking pantomime after almost 32,000 people visited to watch Aladdin at the Leeming Street venue over the Christmas period. The show received rave reviews from the media and customers alike, notably for



its talented cast, great songs, stunning dance routines and plenty of laughter; the perfect ingredients for a truly magical treat for all the family.

Visitor figures for pantomime have crept back up since the pandemic meant the theatre's doors had to close, with 16% more tickets sold this year than 2021 and a further 1% more than 2022. Christmas 2025 panto is on sale now, with 15% sold already!

New chief executive appointed to post

James Biddlestone has been confirmed as the council's new Chief Executive Officer.

Full Council met in December and voted to go ahead with the appointment unanimously. The Executive Mayor announced earlier in the month his commitment to invest and nurture homegrown talent and provide the opportunity for a passionate, Mansfield-focused leader to step forward to take on the role of CEO.

James has been with Mansfield since October 2019 and brings to the role a wealth of experience in service innovation, transformational change and major complex programme delivery. He was previously Strategic Director, Operations and Strategy, and has been a key part of the authority's corporate leadership team for the past five years.

James took up the role officially on Monday 3 February 2025 and said: "I understand the challenges and opportunities ahead and I'm confident that together with our communities and partners, we can take Mansfield District Council forward."

Two bin lorries newly named

Look out your window when you hear the bin collection coming and you may just spot our newly named wagons! Recyclosaurus Rex and Lighting McClean were names chosen by the public following a community competition late last year. The new bin lorries are part of the council's ongoing fleet replacement programme. In the average year they clock up 6,000 miles transporting waste from homes in Mansfield to various refuse collection sites.



Crem donations to John Eastwood

Mansfield and District Crematorium has raised £11,600 this year for the John Eastwood Hospice Trust, in Sutton-in-Ashfield, from a metal recycling scheme. Each year the crematorium donates money it receives from metal recovered from cremations where bereaved families have given permission for it to be sent for recycling. A specialist company is used to sort the metals collected. Proceeds collected nationally from the scheme are then divided among crematoria.

Multi-agency hub submitted for planning consideration

A multi-agency hub that will unlock opportunity and improve the town centre has been submitted for planning consideration.

Mansfield Connect is designed to bring public and educational services under one roof. Located at the former Beales and Co-op stores, the project is funded in large part by welcome government funding, supported by the partners with a stake in the building. The application was formally submitted in December and is scheduled to be considered by the Mansfield planning committee in early May. Subject to a formal approval, partial demolition of the site, asbestos removal, and removal of the link bridges is expected to start from summer, with the full remodel and completion expected in late 2027. The council purchased the building in December 2021 to take control over shaping a new future for the town centre. It forms a key part of the council's adopted Town Centre Masterplan and complements several other regeneration projects and developments being progressed. The scheme also aligns with the council's corporate priorities, creating a welcoming and thriving town centre and supporting sustainable development. You can view the application and submit a comment via the planning

Third phase of new housing starts

The delivery of a third phase of new council homes has reached a significant milestone, with work starting on site.

Mansfield District Council appointed Mercer Building Solutions following a competitive tender process to undertake the construction of 77 high-quality and affordable homes off Centenary Road. The contractor is also delivering social housing, on behalf of the council, on the Bellamy estate.

The £18m project has been conducted in three phases known widely as Poppy Fields. So far, on the site, a total of 84 new homes have been built and are occupied by council tenants.

Phase three works started on site in late November and are due to be completed in summer 2026.



The new 77 homes will be mixed residential, offered at affordable rent, and owned by the council. 47 of the properties have been designated for older people, a mix of apartments and bungalows, and 30 will be for general needs, a mix of apartments and houses. This scheme meets several of the

council's priorities: our communities; supporting people to live independently in suitable, safe, and warm homes. Our district; to deliver affordable housing.

Selective licensing moves to next phase

A scheme that could improve living conditions in residential properties across Mansfield is moving to the next phase. The council is proposing a selective licensing scheme that gives the authority the power to make private rented homes better for people to live in. It will make it mandatory for landlords to have licences for each of their private rented properties, and it will require landlords to meet a minimum standard of accommodation for residents.

The locations covered under the scheme are areas around Central ward, West Bank and Bancroft wards. Market Warsop ward, Wainwright, Eakring and Rock Hill wards. Selective licensing can be applied in areas where there is deprivation, high levels of antisocial behaviour, high levels of crime, high levels of migration, and poor housing conditions. It gives the council powers to do more when landlords are not taking steps to deal with issues relating to property standards and management. I and/ords will be invited to

Landlords will be invited to apply for a licence from June and the scheme will come into force in September this year.

Art, birds, and beasts

Art work by members of a support group at Mansfield Museum has gone on show at Newstead Abbey in an exhibition called Birds, Beasts and Byron. The Green Power group regularly meets at the museum and uses art inspired by the venue's natural history collections to help vulnerable woman build their confidence and selfesteem through creative expression, as a kind of 'Art on Prescription'.

In September last year, Green Power visited Newstead Abbey and forged a creative partnership with the poet Lord Byron's former home, and the flora and fauna that are found there and were part of Byron's life. Now this work has gone on display at the abbey's Project Lab, next to Byron's study. The exhibition runs until until Easter.





Hundreds of tree saplings and whips have been planted to mark the final phase of the Warsop Health Hub project.

The council teamed up, once again, with Sherwood Forest Trust to plant more than 1,500 trees in Carr Lane Park, behind the health hub, to enhance the green space. Members of the council's corporate leadership team, the mayor, the cabinet, council officers, and primary school children from Birklands and Church Vale took part in organised events over December. The sessions have seen, on average, around 200 trees put into the ground per day.

End of an era: Estate shops demolished

A shopping area in the heart of an estate has been demolished as part of a multimillion pound regeneration project.

The shop parade in the Bellamy estate has, over time, become an eye sore to the local area. However, as part of the £7m project, the building is being removed and new homes built in its place. The upgrade has been conducted in phases and has seen the building of the first phase of council homes and a new shop parade. The tenant of the previous shop has now took over all three of the new units. Overall, there will be 22 high-quality, eco-friendly, affordable family council homes built around the newly installed village green area. There will also be a community orchard planted and a new through road, which will allow for improved bus connections through this part of the estate. Work is expected to conclude on the scheme in 2026.



Progress on tech and skills exchange



The creation of an £8.8m skills hub to train people for careers in emerging industries and help businesses adapt to new technologies has taken a major step forward.

Education and council leaders joined construction specialists to see the Future Tech Skills and Knowledge Exchange take shape at West Nottinghamshire College's Chesterfield Road campus. A large steel frame that makes up the 'skeleton' of the impressive structure has been erected, taking it into the next exciting phase of development, which will involve constructing the external elevations, masonry work, installing windows and doors, and completing roof coverings. Due for completion in summer 2025, the flagship facility will accommodate around 300 college students and will deliver qualifications at level 3 and above, with a strong focus on innovation and STEM (science, technology, engineering and maths) subjects.



Visitor economy bouncing back!

New figures show that tourism is continuing to bounce back in Mansfield following on from the pandemic.

The number of visitors and economic impact of tourism on the district is being monitored by Global Tourism Solutions so we can better understand the importance of the visitor economy. New analysis of the data for Mansfield shows:

- The visitor economy was worth £130.76m, up from £124.75m in 2022 and making good progress back to the 2018 high of £147.23m.
- The figures show there were 2.82m visitors to the district, up 4.2% on the 2022 figure of 2.71m in 2022 but still below the pre-pandemic figure of 3.22m in 2019.
- Most people visited Mansfield to go shopping, which accounted for 42% of expenditure, followed by food and drink at 29.3%.
- Spring and early summer were the most popular times of year to visit the district in 2023 with 300,000 visits May and 291,000 in June.

Local Government Reorganisation

On 17 December, the government announced a whitepaper on Power and Partnership: Foundations for Growth. The paper sets out how it intends to deliver on 'devolution revolution' over the course of this parliament. Headlines include plans to extend devolution to all parts of England, additional powers and funding flexibility for mayors, and the replacement of two-tier local government with unitary authorities. All council leaders across Nottinghamshire are meeting weekly to discuss the requirements. Detailed work will be undertaken to develop and test initial options, with initial responses submitted in late March. Following the County Council elections in May, further work, will be carried out on preferred options before members consider proposals for reorganisation to submit to government in the autumn.

Waste collection changes coming for businesses

The government is introducing 'Simpler Recycling', a new set of legal regulations designed to make recycling easier. It will first affect businesses with 10 employees or more from 31 March 2025 onwards. Any business or workplace that generates waste that is similar to household waste must follow these rules. This means all businesses will need to have separate collections

for: glass, metal, plastic, paper & cardboard, and food waste. For council trade waste customers, we will be liaising with you directly.
