A message from the Mayor

Improvements are taking shape

After years developing and planning schemes to improve the district, we are now seeing real changes to our landscape. New affordable council homes for rent are going up on the Bellamy estate, Centenary Road, we have planning on the derelict White Hart Street site in the town centre, and a £2m refurbishment project of Mansfield Market Place. Elsewhere, in partnership with West Nottinghamshire College, the £8.8m Ambition Exchange has opened to students. The health and well-being of our residents is another priority. Helping people with their first steps

The council has set up another innovative housing initiative to make it easier for former rough sleepers to turn their lives around.

Since 2020-21, with the help of homelessness prevention funding from the government, the council has run a scheme to house rough sleepers called the First Steps, which offers accommodation combined with wraparound support for substance misuse, mental health and tenancy sustainment problems they may have. The scheme has so far had nearly 300 people referred to it over five years including rough sleepers and single homeless people in need of support and at risk of becoming rough sleepers. The council has now commissioned 11 Next Steps homes. This is operating alongside the existing First Steps scheme. As well as helping tenants move on with their lives, Next Steps will create a move on pathway out of supported housing to free up space for current rough sleepers on the streets.



Relive heritage with film programme



Mansfield Palace Theatre is returning to its roots by offering a selection of film screenings.

The venue originally opened its doors in 1910 as The Palace Electric Theatre - the town's first purpose-built cinema. Now, the Palace will be reliving its heritage by screening a carefully curated programme of timeless classics in its historic setting. Among the year-round programme will be cult films, art documentaries, films by independent producers and special event screenings.

Selective licensing now in force

A scheme for landlords that requires them to improve private rented homes for residents is now in force.

The council ran a consultation last year asking for feedback on its selective licensing proposals that covered numerous areas in the district. The scheme will now make it mandatory for landlords to have licences for each of their private rented properties, and it will require landlords to meet a minimum standard of accommodation for residents.

The areas covered under the consultation are within Central and Bancroft wards, West Bank and Wainwright wards, Market Warsop ward, Eakring and Rock Hill wards. This affects an estimated 1,200 properties in total. Applications for the scheme are open for landlords and the scheme will remain in effect until 10 September 2030.

Selective licensing can be applied in areas where there is deprivation, high levels of antisocial behaviour, high levels of crime, high levels of migration, and poor housing conditions. It gives the council additional powers when landlords are not taking steps to deal with issues relating to property standards and management.

Supported housing project leads the way

The council has made significant progress in improving standards in supported housing through its Supported Housing Improvement Project (SHIP). Launched in 2022 with government funding as part of a national pilot involving 26 local authorities, SHIP was introduced ahead of the Supported Housing (Regulatory Oversight) Act 2023 to help test and develop best practice in the sector. Mansfield is the only district in Nottinghamshire to have received funding specifically to improve supported housing standards accommodation often used to house vulnerable or homeless people. Following the success of the project, the council's funding has been extended for a third year. Over the past two years, the council has worked closely with supported housing providers and other stakeholders to deliver real improvements in property standards, support quality, and housing benefit oversight.

People across Nottingham and Nottinghamshire have been invited to share their views on the future of local government.

A survey launched in summer with the aim to gather public feedback on what matters most to local people and organisations, to help shape new authorities' priorities.

The decision to launch a local government reorganisation process was taken by central government, who wrote to local authorities in February formally asking them to submit proposals to create new structures of 'unitary authorities' – which is a single tier of local government responsible for all local services in an area. The aim is to create more efficient and effective local government, potentially leading to streamlined services and cost savings. Under LGR, all nine existing local authorities would be abolished, to create new unitary councils with a higher



population of residents. It is being proposed that two new unitary councils should be created for Nottingham and Nottinghamshire to replace the current nine.

Two core options are currently being considered:

- 1. A new unitary authority combining Nottingham, Broxtowe, and Gedling, with a second new unitary authority for the rest of Nottinghamshire; Mansfield, Ashfield, Newark and Sherwood, Bassetlaw and Rushcliffe. This is known as 1b.
- 2. A new unitary authority combining Nottingham, Broxtowe, and Rushcliffe, with a

second new unitary authority for the rest of
Nottinghamshire; Mansfield, Ashfield, Newark
and Sherwood, Bassetlaw and Gedling. This is
known as 1e. At this stage, no final decision has
been made on a single option, and some councils
could still explore additional proposals alongside the

Bringing pride to Mansfield

Businesses, community organisations, influencers and residents are being asked to spread positivity and pride for Mansfield by signing up to become ambassadors for the district.



After nearly 12 months in the making, Mansfield District Council and the Mansfield Place Board presented the new Destination Mansfield branding at the launch of one the project's flagship events, the stunning Gaia art installation at the town's theatre in April. As well as seeing the new branding for the first time, they also received a copy of the Mansfield storybook and learnt about how they can adopt the brand as the district's first ambassadors. Ambassadors will be asked to represent Mansfield, educate their teams and networks about the key messages for the district and participate in events and activities to showcase Mansfield. Businesses are also asked carry the new emblem in the windows of their premises and have a stock of the Mansfield story in their venues for customers to read. More information on becoming an ambassador and how to sign up is on the new website - wearemansfield.com.

In return, ambassadors will be offered high profile networking and exclusive event access along with the chance to represent Mansfield at events and meetings.

Destination Mansfield aims to raise the profile of the area over the next two years to help put it on the map, change perceptions, drive investment, provide opportunities for future funding and encourage more visitors to the district. The £715,000 project is backed by £500,000 from the council's £12.3m Towns Fund allocation, alongside council funding.



Local plan review moves to next step



Work has begun to review Mansfield's Local Plan, the key strategy document that acts as a blueprint for development in the future.

Residents, businesses and visitors had their say on housing and business location plans across Mansfield and Warsop through a consultation in the summer.

The feedback and comments will now be considered and used to formulate the next strand of local plan review work.

The local plan sets out a range of policies on matters including housing and employment, climate change, flooding, the historic environment and design quality, and town centres and shopping. It also deals with considerations such as the amount of new development there should be and where it should go. Future stages of the local plan review will identify which sites should be allocated for different types of development.

The current local plan, which was adopted by Mansfield District Council in 2020, sets out guidelines for how the district will grow and change until 2033.

35 homeless households helped to access a home

A scheme to make it easier for people facing homelessness to access private rented homes is proving a big success. The Private Rented Access Scheme was set up by the council in February to help reduce the cost of temporary accommodation and ease the pressure on social housing. In the first four months, the scheme helped 35 households including 27 children. The scheme, which has also attracted interest from other councils, is offered to people who are facing homelessness or housed in temporary accommodation, such as hotels and bed and breakfast. The council facilitates people in these circumstances being rehoused into private rented housing by paying the rental deposits and advanced rent payment to private landlords. In addition, it also works with RentGuarantor, a private company that offers an insurance-backed service to offer extra security for landlords should a tenant fall into rent arrears. Of the 35 households helped by the scheme so far, seven were able to access the accommodation because they took out a policy with

RentGuarantor.

Flooding measures lead to new allotments

Severn Trent has recently completed its £76m project in Mansfield, transforming the town into a more flood resilient community.

Since 2022, the water company has retrofitted 343 sustainable drainage systems (SuDS) across a number of locations.

To celebrate completing the project. Severn Trent began

To celebrate completing the project, Severn Trent began work on an area of some allotments that had become disused and overgrown. It fitted one of their largest SuDS, laid a new access road and cutting back some of the overgrown land to create more plots for the community to use.

The work at Newcastle Street allotments has given the site eight new plots, all of which have already been taken up by residents in the local community.






Mansfield Museum is considering nominations for individuals, groups, schools, or businesses who are going above and beyond to protect and improve our local environment.

A call for nominations was sent out in the summer for people who may be planting trees, protecting wildlife, or encouraging others to take environmental action. A panel of judges will select 12 inspiring winners, who will be featured in a special exhibition next year at the museum, celebrating their contribution to a greener, healthier, and environment-friendly future.

Bellamy first phase of homes completed

Construction work on the first phase of new homes on a major council housing project has concluded.



Part of the estate's upgrade is already complete with a new play park and learn-to-ride cycle track opening earlier this year, as well as the new shop parade.

Now the first phase has been handed back to the council, the next stage, led by Mercer Building Solutions, will see the construction of more eco-friendly, affordable houses built around the newly installed village green area. There will also be a community orchard planted and a new traffic-calmed through road connecting Thorpe Road and Egmanton Road, which will allow for improved bus connections through this part of the estate.

The project supports new employment and supply chain opportunities for local people and businesses, in line with the council's procurement policy.

The council's in-house architects have designed the homes in line with government carbon reduction targets and the Future Homes Standard. The standard requires new homes to have low-carbon heating and high energy efficiency, resulting in considerably lower carbon dioxide emissions than properties built to current Building Regulations.

The houses, comprising three four-bedroom semi-detached houses, eight three-bedroom semi-detached houses, nine two-bedroom semi-detached houses and two two-bedroom detached houses, will be offered at affordable rents and will be owned and managed by Mansfield District Council.

New gym equipment for Oak Tree centre

More Leisure Community Trust (MLCT) have announced that upgrades to the gym facilities at Oak Tree Leisure Centre are now complete.

The refurbished gym features brand-new strength and conditioning equipment, along with an expanded free weights area, now upgraded with weights up to 50kg and redesigned to reduce crowding and improve the workout experience for all fitness levels.

Other significant improvements include noise-reducing and accessible flooring, and a redesigned layout with a dedicated recovery zone that provides space for stretching, core strengthening and mobility exercises.

Previously only a feature of the centre's workout studios, MyZone has now been added into the gym area, allowing members to track their heart rates as they exercise.



Shared Prosperity Fund delivers boost



Mansfield businesses and communities have been significantly boosted by government funding.

An independent evaluation of the district's UK Shared Prosperity Fund (UKSPF) 2022-25 programme shows it reached over 7,000 people in community activities and helped to create 28 jobs by supporting 98 businesses including 17 start-ups.

One of the business helped by the scheme, Electric Bear, said: "We're glad to see local businesses being backed through this funding opportunity. Having direct investment from the UKSPF allows businesses like ours to grow with a focus on results. The fact that it's a grant, not repayable finance, means we can concentrate fully on delivering the impact we've committed to."

Key Achievements

- Exceptional employment and training results, including a 343% overachievement in helping residents into work, and 370% above target for health-related employment support.
- Community regeneration through the support and achievements of projects including Switch Up Mansfield, Volunteer It Yourself, and the Mansfield Community Fund, supporting vulnerable groups and encouraging local pride.



White Hart Street scheme approved

Ambitious plans to transform a long-derelict area of Mansfield town centre into social housing have been given the green light.

The flagship regeneration scheme on White Hart Street was approved by the council's planning committee in June.

The £18 million pound development will breathe new life into the site, delivering 43 affordable homes, revitalising heritage buildings into commercial spaces, and reconnecting the area with the wider town centre. The new council homes will offer a mix of property types, including family houses and apartments for older residents.

The work is expected to begin in winter 2025 and be completed in 2028.

The design for the scheme was developed by Proctor and Matthews Architects, who were selected following a Royal Institute of British Architects (RIBA) international design competition in 2023, commissioned by the council to ensure a distinctive and high-quality architectural approach.

Mansfield celebrates young people with arts and culture

Mansfield is fast becoming a vibrant hub for young people to explore and enjoy arts and culture, thanks to a growing number of exciting schemes and events backed by the council and its partners. With a focus on creativity, skills, and self-expression, initiatives such as the Technical Academy and Young Writers' Workshops are placing young talent at the heart of the town's cultural scene. Simpler Recycling coming soon

Simpler Recycling is a government initiative designed to standardise and streamline recycling across England, making it easier for residents to recycle the same materials regardless of their location. This new approach involves collecting a core set of recyclable materials from households, including paper and card, plastic, glass, and metals (like cans, tins, and foil). There will

be three phases in Nottinghamshire, phase 1, due to come into force in Mansfield from 1 April 2026, allows additional materials to be accepted in the blue bin. This will mean you can put pots, tubs, trays, tubes, cartons and foil in your recycling from that date. From March 2027, films and flexibles will be accepted in the blue bin and from October 2027, food waste collections will begin.

The goal is to increase recycling rates and reduce confusion by providing a consistent system for both households and businesses.



Store must pay £6,300 after hygiene breaches

A Mansfield store has been ordered

to pay a total of £6,334 after it failed to abide by a notice. The notice required food hygiene improvements and was given an order banning it from selling unpackaged raw meat. The order and notice had been put in place at Bil Bolek I Lolek Mansfield Ltd in Stockwell Gate after inspections by Environmental Health Officers found breaches in food hygiene regulations at the store in 2024. Company director Honar Rafik pleaded guilty at Mansfield Magistrates' Court on 5 June to breaching a Hygiene Improvement Notice (HIN) and a Hygiene Emergency Prohibition Order (HEPO).

The Judge fined the company £1,000 for breaching the HIN and £1,200 for breaching the HEPO. The company was also ordered to pay a £880 victim surcharge and £3,254 towards the prosecution costs.

Council marks 80th anniversary of VJ Day

The people of Mansfield joined Executive Mayor Andy Abrahams and representatives of the Royal British Legion to commemorate the 80th anniversary of Victory over Japan (VI) Day on Eriday 15 August The

(VJ) Day on Friday 15 August. The ceremony was held at the War Memorial at Mansfield Civic Centre and also joined the nationwide two minute's silence at 12noon.
